
Ahmad bin Hanbal). Ours may be a humble contribution towards environment protection but it is a conscious effort and we take pride in it and share for others to follow.





After completing 20 years of success with pride, we have already embarked on the journey of next 20 years. The new 1st year has produced results, better than our expectations. Looking back, the critical element in our success was the Quality of Healthcare Delivery. This will remain our core focus as we move forward. As Chief Executive Officer of Shifa International Hospitals Limited I believe that commitment to quality is our prized distinction and guarantor of success.

Increased knowledge, know-how and increased resources are definitely helpful but will not translate into high quality

of healthcare. How one organizes the delivery of care is more important.

Combined and untiring efforts of everyone – healthcare professionals, patients and their families, planners and educators to make the change will lead to better patient outcome, better systems performance and better professional development. These changes should become integral part or second nature of everyone's job, everyday in all parts of the system. Unshakable belief in the idea that everyone in healthcare really has two jobs when he/she comes to works everyday – to do the work and to

improve it. Yes this is the Quality and it has to improve every time - tomorrow we will provide even better care than we provided today.

Successful and high quality service of 21 years has given new energy and new motivation to all the members of Shifa Family. Everybody is enthusiastic and committed to perform even better than a successful yesterday. New avenues are being thought of and explored. Understandably, the current infrastructure has its limitations after 21 years of constant growth. We have expanded into a new facility in nearby G-10 area which will be more of a primary care facility and take some overflows from the main Hospital. We are actively in process of looking into possibilities of Shifa International Hospitals in other cities of Pakistan.

In August our Liver Transplant Team - the only one in Pakistan - achieved another milestone. 100 Transplants from live donors with zero donor mortality and the results of recipients comparable to any respectable international institution. Our Transplant Centre is also performing Kidney and Bone Marrow Transplants with excellent results. We are proud of this team.

New Operating Rooms – our biggest and most ambitious project in last several years is the commissioning of 14 new Operating Rooms, which are fully equipped with latest design and technology. With the existing OTs now we have 22 OTs to serve our patients – and have the best surgical infrastructure in Pakistan. While we are already doing Laproscopic and minimally Invasive Surgeries, we plan to start Robotic Surgery in next 2-3 years.

With over 200 highly qualified consultants and more than 350 young doctors in training, 3700 employees, 500-beds, more than 100 critical beds and 680,000 sq ft built area with complex equipment and technology, all geared towards care and safety of the patients, employees and visitors – this all has beautifully blended into a quality machine which is enviable. I am thankful to every member of Shifa Family for this excellent care and performance.

Providing the best Technology to our patients has been our priority from day one. Recent acquisitions of second latest Linear Accelerator, highly sophisticated ophthalmology and OT equipment are testimony to this.

Our hospital in Faisalabad and the new one in G-10 area are providing the same quality of care at the doorsteps of those communities. We plan to expand this network. Kabul and Dubai Facilitation Centres started during the year, have been slow in the beginning as expected, but have started picking up now.

We are training senior and junior doctors, nurses and paramedical staff from other areas of Pakistan and Afghanistan, in collaboration with Government and Nongovernment organizations. Actually we have become Master Trainers for the Healthcare Professionals in the region. This is a feeling of pride and satisfaction. As we are expanding, we are seeing more and more of our trained medical, paramedical and nonmedical staff in other hospitals of Pakistan and Middle East. We feel proud about it.

Our administrative, financial and professional systems are working more efficiently, smoother and with better cost controls. This is reflecting into increased clinical outcome and higher patient satisfaction and better earnings per share.


With the help of our MIS Department we are rapidly working towards automation in all the areas and within next 12 months almost all the above systems will be automated. Insha-Allahl

Shifa International continues helping increasing number of non-affording patients, through Shifa Foundation. All these patients get the same facilities and same care and respect as other patients at Shifa. The number of Shifa Foundation patients which we treat are limited because of limited availability of funds. Shifa Foundation is constantly making fundraising efforts so that more and more of these less privileged patients can be served.

I, along with every member of Shifa Family, am thankful to Almighty Allah for His guidance and giving us strength and resources to help sick fellow human beings.



Medical Staff Affairs

The Department of Medical Staff Affairs (MSA) develops and manages credentialing, re-credentialing and privileging activities of the medical staff. It plays a pivotal role in implementing various policies & procedures in the best interest of the patients. MSA supports the Medical Staff leadership and committees by providing expert consultation. It ensures that medical staff adheres to the Medical Staff Bylaws, rules and regulations and policies designed for improving the quality, safety and care of our patients.

Our systems allow only the most competent physicians to be appointed. Physicians form our backbone and are an integral part of various committees which develop guidelines & policies. MSA is currently experiencing an intense activity for JCI accreditation process. Led by the Medical Director & the Directors of Medical & Surgical Services, MSA is proud to be current and compliant with all national & international standards.

MSA places an immense importance to the patients' documentation & its easy accessibility. About 75 percent of the patient data is now available online and efforts are under way to have full EMR soon.

MSA remains vigilant throughout the patients stay in the hospital starting with their initial assessment to the time of discharge and ensures that all recommendations at various steps are followed. Stringent measures are taken to control infection so that our patients are discharged in a minimal possible time. Outpatient interactions are also monitored very closely. MSA is actively involved in mortality & morbidity reviews and clinical audits. All patient related complaints are analyzed in detail in MSA and corrective measures are taken whenever necessary.

MSA places considerable emphasis on the capacity building activities for physicians and other healthcare providers and facilitates continuing medical education. Life Assistance skills have been made mandatory for all physicians and other caregivers.

The department directs & oversees all our well sought after internship, residency and fellowship programs. Presently we have 206 trainees in 18 CPSP approved programs. Since its inception in 2003, 37 trainees have passed their FCPS examinations.

Our physician friendly work environment has made it possible to have the highest number of US & UK trained and qualified physicians, under one roof, anywhere in Pakistan. MSA ensures that health, disability & insurance needs of our physicians and their families are met so that their focus always remains on patient care.



Shifa Heart Center

The Heart Centre of Shifa International Hospital is the hub of various general and specialized cardiac services. It is known to be one of the best heart health centers of Pakistan. Angiography, angioplasty, stents, intra aortic balloon pump, EECP and Cardiac MR are some of the services we offer here. Our highly competent consultants have the ability to deal with critical areas and conditions and treatments of heart like Heart Failure, Interventional Cardiology/PCI, CHD/Valve Replacement, Peripheral Vascular Disease & Peripheral Artery Disease (PVD & PAD), Electrophysiology/Arrhythmias, Cardiac Imaging and Cardiac Rehabilitation.

We are equipped with Cardiac CT (640 slice) that is advance and fast technology. It has made possible to record coronary angiogram without placing catheters in the heart. The risk associated with conventional coronary angiography can thus be avoided. The department also provides EP studies with Cardiac ablation, Cardiac Resynchronization Therapy and Implantable Cardiac Defibrillator.

We plan to expand rapidly and our improvement plan is aimed at revolutionizing heart health facilities' culture. Following are some of the initiatives in this regard:

Cardiac MRI Service: The department aims to offer this new and exciting diagnostic modality. We hope to start the service with full strength in 4-6 weeks. Our goal is to establish a full time and dedicated cardiac MR and cardiac CT set up in the upcoming years that can cater to the needs of the region.

National Integrated Anticoagulation Service (NIACS): We take pride in successfully initiating and developing a



comprehensive and integrated anticoagulation service in collaboration with our Hematology department and Roche pharmaceuticals. This is done at a time when anticoagulation is an unregulated and unmonitored therapy in most of the developing countries. We provide an INR monitoring and appropriate dosage facility. We have also acquired smaller strength warfarin for the patients. Now, we intend to extend our services throughout the region and beyond.

Heart failure Service: This unique and pioneering service will help establish SIH in providing extensive and comprehensive health provider. The department plans to start a heart failure treatment optimization service for chronic heart failure patients by autumn this year. If not managed properly, the condition can show worst prognosis than certain cancers. It will be supervised by the consultants and run by cardiology fellows and nurse practitioners. We not only intend to provide support to the patients in the clinic but also through emailing, mobile text and telephones.

Patient Education Program: We realize the importance of educating and informing the general public about health. Thus we plan to do this in association with NUST. The program will be called IMPROVED or Improving Public Perception of Diseases which will produce pamphlets,

INCREDIBLE Heart: To help improve cardiovascular risks in general population, we have started an initiative and research study known as INCREDIBLE or Initiative for Cardiovascular Risk Reduction through Dietary, Behavioral, Lifestyle modifications and Exercise. We welcome sponsors for such milestone study. This program is mainly targeted to younger and middle aged population of the capital city and beyond with multiple cardiac risks. We have incorporated cardiac rehab program into this initiative and are utilizing our cardiac rehab facility as a centre for education and exercise program, obviously introducing people to our resources.

Cardiovascular and Thoracic Surgery

Cardiovascular and Thoracic Surgery Department has matured in the past two decades having performed more than 4000 surgeries. We are proud to have reached a stage where the Department's performance and spectrum of activities is comparable to any good tertiary care centre in the world.

Over the past few years the variety of cases being performed have been expanded from Adult cardiac surgery to more sophisticated sub-specialized fields such as Aortic Root surgery, Thoracoabdominal Aortic surgery, Valve repair, Adult Congenital Cardiac surgery and Pediatric Cardiac surgery.

In addition we have expanded the Thoracic surgery spectrum and currently are offering minimal access tumor resection. lung volume reduction, empyema surgery, and diagnostic procedures. Cosmetic correction of chest wall deformities, diagnosis and resection of mediastinal tumors. Video assisted Thoracoscopic surgery for pneumothorax, pleural effusions diagnosis and therapy are also being performed.


We continue to

expand our charity program in collaboration with various charities both within Pakistan and from abroad. We are especially grateful to Shifa Foundation that continues to come to our patients rescue

from time to time at short notice.

We aim to continue to expand further in the near future and hope to offer endovascular surgery for Aortic aneurysm. Carotid Stenosis and peripheral vascular disease. We also aim to be one of the first institutions to offer Percutaneous valve replacement in Pakistan. Another of our targets is to offer ECMO service for pediatric population and Cardiac and Respiratory failure therapies including Cardiac assisting devices and Cardiac and Lung transplantation in the near future.

As a service to the specialty we aim to start a cutting edge Residency program comparable to the best in the world. We also want to start a diploma in Cardiovascular Nursing in collaboration with Shifa School of Nursing. The education program will help fulfil the dream of our pioneers who envisioned an institution comparable to the likes of Mayo Clinic or the Cleveland Clinic in the United States.



Orthopedics

Orthopedics is one of the significant departments of SIH. We offer all major elective procedures such as hip and knee replacements, knee and shoulder arthroscopies, limb length and limb deformity correction with Ilizarov external fixator, spinal surgery and pediatric orthopedics are being done here. The three member team of young and energetic

surgeons is trained and experienced in modern orthopedic medical & surgical treatment. Two of the surgeons are on the Specialist Register in Ireland and UK.

The department provides 24/7 trauma services and covers all aspects of trauma including pelvic and acetabular fracture fixation, intramedullary nailing, management of open and closed fractures etc.

The standard of care in orthopedic in-patient ward rooms is of the highest quality with specific attention to avoidance of infection. We have nurses in the ward specially trained in orthopedic. A physiotherapist with special training in orthopedic rehabilitation has been dedicated for patient's postoperative rehabilitation.

Our new elective orthopedic theatre has international standard laminar airflow. This minimizes the risk of infection in orthopedic surgical case such as joint replacement and implant surgery. There will be new operation theatres specifically for orthopedics in the near future which are designed at the highest international standards. Moreover,

the newly acquired equipment includes an operating table that can be used to take X-rays during the surgery. Surgeries are done with disposable surgical gowns and drapes to further minimize the infection risk. We have recently acquired a new Image Intensifier which is a specialized X-ray machine that is used to see the position of bones and implants during operation.

The Orthopedic department offers:


- Management of simple and complex fractures and dislocations with internal and external fixations
- Limb deformity correction and lengthening via Ilizarov external fixator - Joint replacements including Total Knee, Hip and Shoulder replacements - Arthroscopies of the knee, ankle and shoulder joint
- Fixation of complex pelvic injuries
- Pediatric Orthopedic surgery including Developmental Dysplasia of Hip, Congenital Hip Dislocations, Club foot management by Ponsetti Technique and surgical club foot correction and many other congenital deformities

The orthopedic unit is progressing rapidly and will soon have recognition for postgraduate training. We also soon hope to welcome onboard a fourth Consultant Orthopedic Surgeon who is fully qualified and has most of his training in Ireland & UK.



I will be discharged today

I am very satisfied with the treatment I am getting at SIH. The doctor's and staff are loveable and caring. The staff takes care of the patients' needs. Dr Waqar Jan and Dr Iffat are highly competent. I came here to get treatment for my broken knee. Examination and tests revealed that I needed a knee replacement surgery. During this time I did not feel even slight pain. Today is my fifth day of surgery and I will be discharged today. My initial walking sessions have also started. One comes to know this hospital actually is only when you visit. People will notice great difference from other hospitals. The well maintained cleanliness is worth praising; even the washrooms are well kept.



Neurology

Neurology, one of the key departments of Shifa International Hospital, has highly trained and qualified neurologists, who along with their dedicated post-graduate trainees and nursing staff, provide inpatient and outpatient services. The division mainly provides diagnosis and treatment options for disease relating to the body's neurological system. We have the honor of establishing the first dedicated Stroke Unit in the region. Fortunately, the department is also credited for having Pakistan's first Dementia patient registry and a registry for maternal and fetal complications in pregnant epileptic women. Our post-graduate training program is also a matter of great pride for us. The goal of the Neurology Residency is to train future leaders in clinical and academic neurology. Currently, we have 6 Post graduate fellows in training.

We offer Neurophysiology services that include Nerve Conduction studies (NCS), Electromyography (EMG), Electroencephalography (EEG), Video EEG monitoring, sleep studies and all types of evoked potentials (somatosensory, brainstem auditory, visual).

We celebrate designated awareness days for common neurological diseases and have put efforts in developing patient awareness materials for Stroke, Alzheimer's, Epilepsy and Multiple Sclerosis. Our research team is actively working on over 15 on-going projects. More than 30 research papers have been published in several renowned international and national indexed medical journals over the course of last five years.

Our future vision includes establishment of a fully facilitated Neuro-Rehab unit which is going to be first of its kind in the country. We also soon aim to establish epilepsy and botox clinic. Initiation of a Parkinson's disease registry is also in the pipeline.

Neurosurgery


The department of Neurosurgery has 4 qualified and experienced neurosurgeons with vast experience in dealing with brain tumors, spinal procedures and vascular and endoscopic procedures. We also provide high quality care for neurosurgical trauma patients and have high quality equipment for spinal fixation and excellent neuro-monitoring facilities. Neurology division at Shifa compliments the Neurosurgery and this combination makes Shifa the ultimate choice for patients.





Like a mother takes care of her child

I was brought unconscious to SIH. When I regained conscious, I found doctors, nurses and my family standing around me. I actually had an accident in 2000 and was treated at a government hospital in Rawalpindi. In April 2013, I again had pain in my head. A friend advised me to visit SIH for this kind of issue. Shifa Cancer Center

Shifa Cancer Center has been providing state of the art medical treatment for cancer patients since the early 90's. Considering the growing burden of the disease, the pioneers realized the need and established the first radiation oncology department in the private sector in 1994. Progressing further, the department developed additional cancer treatment facilities over the years. Now, we are proud to be part of full-fledged Shifa Cancer Centre, established in 2012.

Medical Oncology

We provide comprehensive medical oncology care for solid tumors and hematological malignancies, including chemotherapy and autologous/allogenic Bone Marrow Transplant (BMT). Moreover, there is inpatient care for chemotherapy, supportive care and treatment of emergencies and complications as well. We hold Multidisciplinary Tumor Board regularly at our facility.

The Oncology Day Care Unit is especially designed for patients suffering from various benign and malignant disorders. This Unit offers various diagnostic and therapeutic modalities including blood transfusions for patients with thalassaemia. Other than this, other types of blood component infusion therapy and outpatient cancer chemotherapy for all types of malignant diseases is also available.

Radiation Oncology

Radiation Oncology Department has the privilege of being Pakistan's first radiation therapy center in the private sector. Trained and expert staff of the department has been providing radiation therapy services to cancer patients since 1994.

Currently, we provide 2DRT (Two dimensional Radiation Therapy), 3DCRT (Three dimensional Conformal Radiation Therapy), 1MRT (Intensity Modulated Radiation Therapy) and Arc and Rotational Radiation Therapy.

The department is equipped with a state of the art Liner Accelerator and CT Simulator (Wide Bore). The latter is used for accurate visualization of tumors and normal tissues in each individual patient so that accurate targeting of tumors and protection of normal tissues can be done.


We are the first department to introduce and implement SOPs for radiation therapy including Simulation, Customized Shielding Blocks, Computerized Treatment Planning and Port Films for Treatment Verification.

Moreover, we have the pleasure of being the pioneer center to train many medical physicists and technologists now serving cancer patients in different hospitals of Pakistan as well as abroad.



Competent Doctors, Standardized Treatment

I had surgery for prostate cancer and was being treated for it in Lahore. But I was not satisfied. My experience in other hospitals of Lahore was also not really good. I therefore, finally came to Shifa. Staff in some hospitals doesn't bother guiding the patients where to go. Here at Shifa, I found the staff's attitude very positive. Nephrology

The department of Nephrology deals with the care of the patients with kidney diseases of different stages. With a team of four qualified and experienced nephrologists, our centre has grown into a busy and sought-after center for nephrology services over the last 20 years. The department provides various types of therapies like dialysis, one of its key services. and kidney transplant and also deals with salt, water and electrolyte disorders. There is no doubt that our dialysis centre is one of the best in the country. The department started with just a few machines in the beginning and now has 33 to cater to the needs of the patients. Our dialysis centre offers its services round the clock; even on public holidays. Moreover, outpatient, inpatient and emergency dialysis facilities are also provided here. From doing just a couple of hundred dialysis sessions each month, we now perform than two thousand every month. We have a competent, experienced and dialysis staff that is determined to meet the expectations of the patients. The centre

also trains new dialysis

We now also provide CRRT (Continuous Renal Replacement Therapy) to the critically ill patients. Our department is also performing interventions like kidney biopsies and dialysis access placements. Permanent dialysis access like Arteriovenous fistulas and grafts are also formed here. Living related kidney transplantation is also being done at Shifa and we have performed more than 250 renal transplantations so far.

We have an active fellowship program (FCPS) recognized by the College of Physician and Surgeons of Pakistan and presently eight fellows are doing their fellowship. The department is committed to play its part in serving the community by providing the best trained, knowledgeable and hard working nephrologists.

We plan to upgrade the dialysis centre into a custom made unit with 60 machines. The department also aims to establish a chain of satellite dialysis units in different parts of the country where our trained fellows will provide health services to the needy patients near their homes.



Cleaner Environment, Great Experience

As soon as I came to know I had a kidney problem, I came to Shifa. My friend had been treated here earlier and he advised me to visit SIH. I was admitted for two days. I do not have treatment experience of any other hospital. But I am aware that there is a huge difference. I travelled all the way



Liver Transplant/Hepatobiliary & Pancreatic Surgery

With 90% success rate, the department of Liver Transplant/Hepatobiliary & Pancreatic surgery has performed 107 liver transplants till now. This is a great achievement of the department. We offer adult and pediatric living donor liver transplantation on regular basis. We also perform all major pancreatic cancer surgeries including whipples operation along with vascular resection & reconstructions. The department also does minor and major liver resections for metastatic rumors, gallbladder cancer and cholangiocarcinomas. We perform portosystemic shunt operations in children & adolescents with portal vein thrombosis.

We are the country's leading unit offering comprehensive care in liver, pancreas and biliary pathologies under the umbrella of a multidisciplinary team. Our transplant and hepatobiliary experience has been recognized at international forums and we have been awarded with travel grant as well. Our work has been presented at international liver transplant society and international HPB annual congresses in London, Sydney and Seoul. The unit is very active on academic front as well. We also provide fellowships training in liver transplant & HPB surgery.


We are aiming and working on to become one of the leading liver and pancreatic surgery units in the next 3-4 years.





Today I am alive because of these doctors

I suffered from hepatitis C since 2003. Even after completion of treatment course from Gujranwala my condition worsened. In 2013, I experienced a complication in which my stomach got filled with water. After a few days I got this horrifying news that I had cancer. I was also told that I had just one month left and liver transplant was the only option. My family decided to take me to India. Meanwhile, one day we saw a doctor on TV saying that Liver transplant service was available in SIH. We immediately came here. The doctor's gave me hope and I was the 6th case in Shifa's history to get the transplant surgery. I was hopeful that I would survive. Dr Faisal Saud Dar did my surgery. SIH was considerate enough to transfer me under Shifa Foundation when the funds for my treatment exhausted. The best thing about doctors and management here is that they never leave the patient alone and do not stop treatment if the patient can no longer afford it. After Allah, today I am alive because of these doctors. My brother was my donor. Along with the recipient, the team also takes great care of the donor. The liver donation process is very transparent and only relatives are allowed to donate. I pray that SIH grows by leaps and bounds.



Internal Medicine

Specialists of Internal medicine apply scientific knowledge along with clinical expertise to the diagnosis, treatment, and care of adults across the spectrum from health to complex illness. Internists often act as consultants to other physicians to help solve puzzling diagnostic problems. Hence, are sometimes referred to as the "doctor's doctor".

Patients' problems may be common or rare, simple or complex. But an Internist is especially trained to deal with all sorts of problems. They have expertise to solve challenging diagnostic problems and can handle severe chronic illnesses and multiple problems that can strike at the same time. Moreover, they consider themselves responsible to provide an understanding to the patient about disease prevention and the promotion of health, women's health, substance abuse, mental health, as well as effective treatment of common problems of the eyes, ears, skin, nervous system and reproductive organs. Department of Internal Medicine has a wide range of clinical offerings, including but not limited to, general practice, acute and chronic illness, annual check-ups, well-woman checkups, preventive medicine, insurance medicals, immunizations, travel advice and inpatient services including pre-operative evaluation.



With doctors I feel as with friends

I have been visiting Shifa since past 8 years. I initially came for diabetes treatment but later other associated illnesses like heart and kidney problems came to surface. My experience with Dr Aamer has been really good. After Allah, it is because of Dr Aamer that I am able to cope with so many diseases. Patients at Shifa are treated really well. They listen to the patient and make him feel he is talking to his friend. Earlier I used to go to local hospitals, but since I came to Shifa I have never been to any other hospital. Urology & Kidney Transplant

Shifa's Urology and Kidney Transplant
Department remains at the forefront of
treatment of various urological problems.
These treatment options range from office
urology, endourology, pediatric urology,
laparoscopy, reconstructive surgeries, urological
oncology and urogynacology. Eight experienced
and well trained urologists including a full time
pediatric urologist provide their service thus covering
entire spectrum of Urology.

We are equipped with state of the art lithotripter and provide facility to all age groups. Ancillary help of general anesthesia has made lithotripsy possible even in young children including infants.


The department has fortunately become a comprehensive unit with the provision of kidney transplantation. And its results are comparable to international level.

I came to Shifa in May 2014 for a checkup. I was recommended various tests and was eventually diagnosed with a tumor for which I had to undergo surgery. One of my kidneys needed to be removed as well. I went to some other hospitals for treatment as well but I found Shifa the best, I didn't feel I was admitted in a hospital. The air did not have the medicine odor which is usually present in hospitals and the environment was really clean. Other than the doctors, even nurses and staff have a great attitude towards patients.



Ophthalmology

Ophthalmology at Shifa provides state of the art anterior and posterior segment eye surgeries. We have latest Zeiss lumera operating microscope with inbuilt focusing for anterior and posterior segment procedures. It has up to 1.75mm small incision phacoemulsification with Infinity using unifocal, multifocal and toric foldable intraocular lenses to match individual needs.

We perform a range of glaucoma surgeries that include using antimetablites and Valve surgeries for resistant cases. The department also has state of the art 25 G with valve, posterior vitrectomy with intraocular laser options and expertise to treat retinal and macular disorders. We are affiliated with American Tissue Bank International (Donor bank) for comeal transplants for all ages. The department also has a trained optometrist and strabismologist for pediatric care. The clinic also provides diabetic Retinopathy treatment in the form of laser and ANTI VEGF injections. There is a wide range of diagnostic equipment available including OCT, corneal tomogram Bscan, Biometry, Fundus angiography which help in the diagnosis of different eye disorders.



It is Pakistan's best hospital

I have come here for the first time. I was suffering from cataract since past 30 years. I went to many hospitals for treatment but it went in vain. My friend then suggested me to visit SIH. Here, the doctor recommended a surgery after which I am completely alright. Shifa is a great hospital and I am satisfied with their services. It is Pakistan's best hospital. We get everything under one roof. And the attendants are not told to run around and bring this or that for the patient.

Plastic Surgery

Shifa's Plastic Surgery Department, with three full time consultants and one associate consultant, provides a variety of cosmetic and reconstructive procedures. The consultants are highly qualified US and UK trained surgeons who are recognized internationally as well. They have an experience in plastic, reconstructive and hand surgery.

The department is well equipped to handle difficult cases that are tertiary referrals from plastic surgeons of other hospitals. They require complex reconstruction, often necessitating Microvascular Tissue Transplantation (Free flaps). More than 200 such cases requiring free tissue transfer have been done since 2009. We confidently say that the success rate of these cases have been 99 percent. The Plastic Surgery clinic is also involved in collaborative work with other specialties like ENT for head and neck cancer patients, orthopedic surgeons for bone and soft tissue sarcomas and limb salvage and interventional radiologists for embolisation of vascular malformations. Other than elective cosmetic and reconstructive procedures, plastic surgery department provides round the clock service of lower limbs, digit and hand amputation, chemical and electric burns and brachial plexus injury.

The department is recognized for full time residency program in plastic and reconstructive surgery by College of Physicians and Surgeons of Pakistan since January 2010. Currently, we have three residents and two senior medical officers. The first resident who cleared his FCPS II is now an Assistant Consultant at Shifa. The department is also a role model of academic excellence for elective rotations with approximately 12 residents completing their compulsory one month elective rotations every year. Since 2012, three international undergraduates have completed their electives.


We are not far behind when it comes to academics. In a short time, we have managed to publish three papers in PubMed indexed journals, two of which are international journals and two papers have been accepted for final review. The department also has the honor of two gold medals for best paper presentation in two consecutive Annual meetings of Pakistan Association of Plastic Surgeons in 2013. Two chapters on plastic surgery have been published in a book title "Complex Injuries of the Hand" and one chapter in the book FRCS General surgery road to success.

The department is looking forward to expanding its cosmetic surgery services and hoping to start new reconstructive procedure like craniofacial surgery. With a unique blend of experience and youthful enthusiasm, it is well placed to excel in these endeavors. The department has also joined hands with renowned charity program "The Smile train project" to give quality care treatment to poor cleft lip and palate patients.



I can't think of going anywhere else

Other than being close to my home, I chose Shifa because it is the city's most standardized hospital. I have lived in Australia for two years and I don't find much difference between Shifa and the hospitals there. There is no doubt that it is an international hospital. Patient care is so important for them. I had breast cancer for which I underwent amputation. Later I was sent to plastic surgery for breast reconstruction. Here, the doctors looked after me with great care. The lower staff is also praiseworthy. Mother & Child Health

Mother and child have a beautiful and strong bond that can be best taken care of at Shifa International Hospital owing to the highly trained and qualified professionals along with state-of-the-art technology of Obs/Gynae and Pediatrics departments.

Obs/Gynae

One of the busiest tertiary care centres of Shifa is the Obs/Gynae department which has achieved the status of a referral centre. The department houses 56 beds including 5 labor beds. We provide services for all major and advanced conventional surgeries and also have a full range of endoscopic surgeries (laparoscopy, hysteroscopy). Fluoroscopy of fallopian tubes and mammography are also available.



We deliver around 2500-3000 babies every year. We have successfully delivered babies even as small as 26 weeks. Our department is backed by the Pediatric Department which has hi-tech neonatal ventilators. The department's out-patients have reached around 36000 and in-patients around 8000.

The department offers Epidural analgesia, and antenatal/intranatal fetal monitoring 24/7. We plan to get intensive care and first stage labor beds. The department is also into training: 16 postgraduate trainees IMCPS, FCPS, MRCOGS, UKI and six house officers are getting trained as recognized by CPSP, RCOG (UK) and PMDC.

Projects in our pipeline are:

1. Expanding Satellite OPD services in Rawalpindi and Islamabad.

 Assisted Reproductive Therapy like IUI (already being practiced), IVF, ICSI and the whole range:

3. Stem Cell Therapy for various ailments in collaboration with "STEM LIFE" Malaysia. One patient has already been investigated. In this connection we will soon develop "Fetal Cord Blood Bank".

4. Chorion Villous Sampling of fetus for various congenital and genetic problems.

5. In few days time we will be inaugurating a full-fledged Shifa International Hospital in G-10/4, Islamabad. This will help us in catering to the growing needs of the patients seeking tertiary care from us.

Pediatrics


One of the oldest departments of Shifa International Hospital is the Pediatrics which provides primary care facility including but not limited to, well-child clinic, vaccinations, developmental assessment and 24/7 service through Emergency Department. The outpatient, inpatient, neonatal intensive care unit and pediatric intensive care unit are available here.

Our faculty is considered to be of highest caliber in the region catering large area of northern Punjab, KPK. AJK and neighboring Afghanistan as well. We have eleven faculty members; post-graduate degree holders from USA. UK and Pakistan

The Pediatrics patient has turnover of more than 35000 per year. Up to 3000 children are born every year in the hospital. About 20 percent of all the newborns are at high risk and need level-II or level-III care during their stay in the hospital. The department houses 73 beds that include 32 neonatal intensive care beds. A well equipped 9 bedded Pediatric intensive care unit has recently been established and a full time Pediatric Intensive care specialist is on board who would manage post-op pediatric cardiothoracic surgery patients as well.

We offer sub-specialty services in the disciplines of pediatrics gastroenterology and liver transplant, pediatrics nephrology, urology and renal transplant, pediatric intensive care unit, pediatric hematology/oncology and bone marrow transplant. The department fortunately had a pediatric surgeon on board who provides pediatric and neonatal surgeries.

Department of Pediatrics has been recognized by College of Physician and Surgeons of Pakistan for FCPS and MCPS training. As for now, 27 postgraduate trainees and 15 house officers are being trained in the department.



Critical Care & Pulmonary Medicine


With the department of Critical Care and Pulmonology Medicine, Shifa has the honor of being the only hospital in Pakistan that offers critical care services with largest number of beds (100 plus).

The department offers a variety of services to patients with pulmonary problems.

Our highly experienced and foreign trained consultants manage patients according to the International trends and concept of "Closed ICU".

We have state-of-the-art equipment like Bronchoscopy suite which is laced with two fiber optic Olympus Bronchoscopes, new Raphael Silver Ventilators and Nelcor Puritan Bennett Ventilators, Pulmonary function lab Vitalograph and BEARS Non-invasive Ventilator.


The department is not far behind when it comes to academics, a fellowship program is offered in Critical Care Department. Other than this, we have also made efforts to improve patient care with round-the-clock availability of a Medical Specialist in ICU. Moreover, to decrease mortality level in critically patients in ICU, we have initiated CRRT in the department. Shifa International hospital is one of the three hospitals in Pakistan to have started CRRT.





I can do my work independently now




Endocrinology and Diabetes Department

Department is one of the crucial and busy departments. It
not only diagnosis and manages patients with diabetes, but also
treats obesity, hormonal disorders, thyroid problems, short stature,
pituitary/adrenal/bony disorders and metabolic syndrome - both in the
outpatient and inpatient areas. But majority patients come for treatment of Diabetes Mellitus type 2 which
is the most common Endocrine disease. We provide all services including prevention, medical management,
education, nutrition, foot and eye care to these patients. The department is greatly supported by highly
skilled and professional nursing staff.

The patients are facilitated by Shifa's well-equipped laboratory and radiology departments where all sorts of hormonal tests are conducted.

We are actively involved in public awareness programs, educational activities and medical research. We celebrate public awareness programs on "Diabetes and Ramadan" and "World Diabetes Day" every year.


Allergy & Immunology Medicine

With increasing numbers of allergy patients in the region, Allergy/Clinical Immunology Department is a highlight especially when seasonal allergy problems strike. The clinic provides state of the art care for patients suffering from all kinds of allergic diseases, including but not limited to allergic skin diseases, urticarias, contact dermatitis, allergic rhinitis allergic conjunctivitis, allergic bronchial asthma, atopic dermatitis drug allergies and food allergies.

We perform modern methods of allergy skin tests and immunotherapy at Shifa. Sublingual immunotherapy for selected allergens is also offered here. The department takes special interest in life threatening anaphylactic disorders and insect sting allergies. Our main goal is to educate patients and their families about their illnesses so that they have a better understanding of their disease and treatment.

The department has a board certified Allergist/Immunologist with thirty years of clinical experience in the field.






The doctors have healing powers

Learned to control my anger




The department looks forward to extend its services further in the field of Laser therapy.

Nutrition-Medicine

The Nutrition department caters to the needs of patients regarding nutritional management and helps the patient set a roadmap towards a desirable nutritional status and healthier lifestyle. We focus on the impact of foods and nutrients on health and disease management. Our special nutrition programs include hypertipidemia, diabetes eating disorders and hypertension treatment. Depending on the patient's condition, the extended treatment program service is offered as a continuation of the above mentioned treatments.

Nutrition therapy provides the nutrient prescription that involves an oral diet, dietary supplement, enteral and parenteral nutrition for caring of hospitalized and home patients. At Shifa, new and improved diets and delivery techniques are used to administer nutrients both safely and effectively, based on the latest research available globally.


We offer tailor-made nutritional plans for every patient, depending on the patient's life-style, eating habits and medical history. The hospital has state-of-the-art computer assessment tools to precisely determine the fat, lean body mass and water contents of the patient's body, and the patient's unique basal metabolic rate by the Body Composition Analyzer. This can help to determine the goal of the tailored nutritional plan for the patient. For weight management, patient receives a potent behavior modification training and cognitive restructuring in order to remove the underlying causes of excess weight. The department also provides supervised, patient specific healthy diet and exercise plan which is designed to achieve permanent weight management.

Anesthesia & Pain Management




Shifa's Anesthesia Department is the only private hospital in the capital city that provides Pain Medicine facility. The department has modern modalities and highly trained therapists for managing pain. The Pain Management clinic covers prevention, treatment and alleviation of chronic and acute pain like cervical and lumbar radiculopathies, arthritis etc.

Patients of Cervical spondylosis, lumbar spondylosis etc. can benefit from this service. Our pain management team includes medical practitioners, clinical psychologists, physiotherapists, occupational therapists, and nurses.

The primary function of the department of Anesthesiology is to provide all types of surgical procedures, including but not limited to, adult cardiothoracic, congenital cardiac, neurosurgical, major vascular, transplant, general, urological and Obs/Gyne surgenes. We also provide anesthetic care to MRI, CT and ultrasound guided procedures. The department also provides additional anesthesia services like pre-anesthesia evaluation, epidural anesthesia, patient controlled analgesia, acute pain management and chronic pain management.

Our anesthesiology program is fully recognized for PG training by College of Physicians & Surgeons of Pakistan.

We have nine state-of-the-art Operation Theaters that have the most modern and latest instruments and equipment. Excellent infection control is the hallmark of our operation theaters.



International Hospital's department offers specialized treatment for adult and pediatric patients. The Centre of Implant Dentistry, Orthodontics & Dentofacial Orthopedics (CODO).


The Dental Clinic has become the Centre of Excellence in its field and has grown into a state-of-the-art modern clinic since its inception in 2001. The six consultants are foreign qualified and specialists in their respective fields. We also have two medical officers in the department. We offer Restorative dentistry, Implant dentistry, Oral Surgery, Orthodontics, Pediatric dentistry, Prosthetic dentistry, Periodontology and Endodontics. Other than this, we provide tooth whitening, smile makeover and aesthetic dentistry services too.

We take pride in being the first centre in Islamabad to provide lingual braces/invisible braces, which are fitted behind the teeth.

The department has five dental surgery rooms, equipped with hitech dental chairs, digital X-rays and other necessary accessories. There is a separate room for sterilization, which is equipped with type B latest autoclaves. The instruments are scrubbed manually and cleaned, washed in the ultrasonic bath and then packed in the pouches and sterilized in the autoclaves.

Our beautiful and spacious waiting area is designed to be child-friendly and suitable for patients with special needs.

The increasing number of patients over the last decade is a proof that our patients have complete confidence in our high quality services. The department strives to provide the best quality of dental care to the patients in the hospital.





Emergency

Emergency department is one of those functional areas in the hospital which is always at the forefront of patient care. It operates 24 hours a day; to treat patients suffering from acute illness or seriously injured that may lead to severe complications if not treated quickly. Patient flow in ER increased from 16330 in 2010, to 26698 in 2012. Majority visits had a severity level of minor to moderate.

We have 2 full time consultants, 5 assistant consultants and 20 doctors with an Associate manager, ACNM and about 32 nursing staff. The department has made drastic efforts to improve quality of service. We have managed to decrease the waiting time to be seen by a doctor to 15 minutes.







Nursing

The primary goal of the Nursing department at Shifa International Hospital is to provide the best patient care services. Incorporation of humanity and respect in providing nursing care is vital to the process of healing. Nursing division reflects the belief in a set of core values that are fundamental excellence in services shared and upheld by the nursing management staff and other clinical partners.

The hospital envisions creating a centre of excellence in nursing services and education. Shifa is one of the few hospitals in Pakistan where staff is encouraged to utilize its potential in a safe, supportive and encouraging work environment.

Currently the nursing division is committed to extend its services to 550 beds including 32 beds of neonatal intensive care, 65 beds of intensive care, 20 beds for day care chemotherapy and 17 beds for day care surgery. The emergency services for 24/7 are a hallmark of its contribution. The nursing division has flourished marvelously to more than 600 nurses of which 60 nurses are holding a baccalaureate degree in nursing and 150 paramedical staff is currently working at SIH. The volume of the knowledge in the health care arena expands daily. Since its inception, Shifa is committed to upgrade its human resource to meet the challenges in service and technology. The nurses have been trained at national and





international levels in the provision of highly specialized area of care. In 2014 Shifa has sponsored 75 nurses for ICU, ER and diploma in cardiology program. Moreover, 30 nurses are sponsored for Post RN BScN degree program this year.

To seek accreditation from Joint Commission International (JCI) there is a focus on program improvement of healthcare facility. Continuous professional development for managerial and nursing staff is being offered by Nursing Education Services Department through Quality management programs. To promote evidence based practices, nursing management has developed area specific key performance indicators, and encourages participation of nurses in internal and external audits for quality assurance.




In-Patient Department (IPD)


Rehabilitation can assist in recovery and faster mobility from almost any chronic ailment, hospitalization or surgery. We offer services that aim to improve movement, gait and manage pain, functional abilities of daily living, verbal communication and swallowing problem, well being through exercise and hydrotherapy. These therapies improve quality of life of the patient and help them become productive members of the society.

A thorough assessment is done by qualified physiotherapist, speech therapist or occupational therapist and implementation of treatment plan is one of the key features of our services.

Our Physiotherapy services offer treatment for cardiac, gynecology, orthopedic, neurology, pediatric, chest, pulmonary, hydrotherapy and pain management patients. We also provide services for speech therapy and swallowing, speech pathology, occupational & sensory integration, autism & behavior, applied behavior analysis, IQ testing, fitness program and home health services. We will soon be starting Orthotic services as well.

Shifa International Hospital is a pioneer in initiating Home health services in this region. Physiotherapy is one of the services that is being provided at the patient's door step. The philosophy behind introducing this unique service is to achieve rapid and durable outcomes, continuation of treatment care through the provision of home help and home based attendant care training in activities of daily living with the help of skilled medical professionals. This is a cost effective and time saving service that has no risks for the patient.

Physiotherapy services are also being offered at Shifa Medical center PWD and F-11 sector. We are going to start Physiotherapy, Speech therapy & Occupational services at Shifa International Hospital G-10 sector as well.





CLINICAL/Ancillary

Laboratory

Diagnostic services at Shifa International Hospital are rapidly enhancing to achieve the highest standards in the country. There are six subspecialties including Diagnostic Surgical Pathology, Hematology, Blood Bank Services, Chemical Pathology, Microbiology and Immunology. These sections are rapidly expanding not only in terms of addition of new automated equipment but also with expert and qualified technical staff. They work under direct supervision of experienced and foreign qualified consultants and believe that knowledge is ongoing process. We are expanding it by continuous training from abroad as well as conducting seminars for budding pathologists.

The Laboratory Department is a comprehensive, full-range service and reference laboratory dedicated to provide state-of-the-art quality and timely testing results to area physicians and health care providers. The services are provided 24/7 for patients of all ages through inpatient, outpatient and outreach modalities. We provide Home collection facility as well.

Chemical Pathology

The chemical pathology section utilizes services of a fully automated state-of-the-art integrated chemistry analyzer. This performs routine and specialized chemistry tests including hormones, therapeutic drugs, and drugs of abuse and tumor markers. The scope of tests being performed on this instrument has been expanding with addition of newer tests every year. We also provide services of Osmometry, calculi analysis and blood gases. There is a continuous growth in chemistry tests and we have performed more than 350,000 tests in 2013-2014.

The department is also providing services in emergency rooms as stat chemistry tests which have facilitated health care delivery more efficiently.

With the start of liver transplant, the department is keeping pace with it providing results within minutes during surgery which facilitates the work of surgeons and anesthetists. We have excellent internal and external (USA) quality control program.

Hematology

The services offered at Hematology department include routine hematology test, bone marrow biopsies and complete set of immune testing for final diagnosis of lymphomas / Leukemias. The department is now recognized for getting fellowship in this specialty and trainings have also started. We plan to get automation in most sections to reduce human error and aid our pathologists for accurate and quick diagnosis. To improve accuracy, the section is installing fully automated cell counter which has integrated system with capability of blood film preparation and staining. More than 195,000 tests have been done this year in Hematology section.

Flow Cytometry Lab

We have state-of-the-art Flow Cytometry Lab which has 6-8 color laser equipped instrument, the first of its kind in Pakistan. Our department is fully capable of rendering leukemia and lymphoma diagnosis in accordance to the International Standards in a very short period of time. This process facilitates the oncologists in critical management decisions. The Flow Cytometric analysis is performed by American Board certified Hematopathologist and foreign trained technologist. We take pride in rendering an integrated report within 24 hours.

Histopathology

Diagnostic surgical pathology is one of the busiest departments of the country that has grown by leaps and bounds in the past few years. We offer wide range of services that include exfoliative cytology; fine needle aspiration biopsy in addition to routine histopathology. We have an extensive panel of Immunohistochemistry antibodies for exact diagnosis of tumors. We plan to get an autostainer for immunohistochemistry that will help cope with the increased workload. Tumor diagnosis is also made accurate by correlation with radiologic findings and clinical details by our modern Laboratory Information System (LIS) which has made possible to view every patient's radiology and all other parameters which are mandatory for accurate diagnosis. Moreover, the department is equipped with latest Immunofluorescence techniques for diagnosis of

renal and skin biopsies. This technique needs expertise and fluorescent microscope in this regard, Nephrologists not only across northern area of the country but also from Faisalabad, Lahore and Peshawar are sending tests for diagnosing renal diseases here. Frozen section facility for quick intra-operative diagnosis is also being used by adjacent large hospitals where the facility is unavailable.

We have a highly professional team that includes six histopathologists with special expertise in renal, liver, breast, head, neck and hematopathology. The technical staff is highly trained and experienced with ongoing training program.

The department has started (FISH) fluorescence in situ hybridization technique, initially oncogene HER2/neu that will be performed for breast and gastric cancer by FISH technique. In the coming year, we plan to use this for the detection of genetic abnormalities in other tumors as well. Our expert oncologists require this for planning exact treatment of cancer.

The department has initiated a tumor registry since January 2012 which will be a source of reliable data for research of cancer affecting our population. Most cancer patients are now discussed with a panel that includes Oncologists, Radiologists, Pathologists and treating Surgeons before their treatment. This Tumor board meeting is one of the big achievements of the departments.

Liver transplant at Shifa International Hospital has added another dimension to our pathology services as we are dealing with biopsies from donors and recipients as well as explanted livers. We hope to gain expertise in this area which is so far uncharted territory in this country.

The surgical pathology department also runs a vibrant residency program to obtain fellowship in this field. We aspire to become one of the best departments of Pakistan comparable to any in the developed world.

Microbiology

Microbiology Lab deals with routine culture and sensitivity testing providing patient care and catering to the needs of our Infection Control department. It is established and equipped with TB Lab which started functioning in 2005. We have started new tests for fabric Industry mandatory for export purposes in 2010 including Quantitative and Qualitative testing. Microbiology has started full range of viral detection including antibody status. We are equipped with a new PCR diagnostic lab which is going to look after the rapid testing of Mycobacterium tuberculosis from smear positive pulmonary specimens. Minimal inhibitory concentration (MIC) testing of some antibiotics has been started in house. Moreover, the Microbiology Department has launched antifungal sensitivity testing of yeasts and molds.



Blood Transfusion Services


BTS takes more than 10.000 blood donations a year and performs viral screening on more than 25,000 samples. The department provides special services like plasmapheresis, stem cell harvest, and single donor plateletpheresis besides running 24/7 for routine donation and issuance service: BTS performs ELISA testing for many rheumatic and few infectious disorders besides basic immunology for antibody screening. Recently pre-storage leukodepletion and cryoprecipitate production by blood transfusion service has added to the quality of care for critical patients. The department has supported 1st live donor liver transplant program in Pakistan by providing around 2,000 blood products on emergency basis for 35 transplant patients in one year.

Molecular Diagnostic Lab

Shifa International Hospital has recently established a state-of-the-art PCR Lab for the diagnosis of infectious disease like Hepatitis B. C and genotyping. The lab is equipped with a fully automated walk-away instrument which helps in accurate diagnosis with least chances of any contamination. The results are interpreted by American Board certified Pathologists. Our future goals of broadening test base by including CMV PCR, EBV PCR and HLA GENOTYPING BY PCR.

Phlebotomy

The Phlebotomy section deals with collection of blood samples for the required tests. This is the most sensitive area of the Laboratory, which gives the impression of quality of work for the entire laboratory. Blood collection requires skill, a professional attitude and decorum. Proper patient identification and specimen labeling through barcodes, is essential in providing accurate results that can safely be used in decision making by the physician which minimizes the pre-analytical errors.





Radiology

Driven by the insatiable motivation to offer the highest level of patient care, Department of Radiology at Shifa International Hospital is where the action has never ceased. The once planted tiny seed occupying a few rooms in the basement of the hospital has now blossomed into a department in full bloom occupying an entire block on the first floor.

During its multi-dimensional unparalleled expansion, no stone was left unturned to deliver the best the world has to offer in the world of diagnostic imaging and interventional procedures. The foundation was laid by a team of the most highly qualified individuals backed by experience from some of the world's leading institutes. They made sure the department set of in the right direction and had the vision to take it to the peaks of optimized performance.

A workman is as good as his tools. To make sure expertise of the individuals could be delivered optimally to the patients, the department set out to acquire some of the latest state of the art machines available in the international market. This made the department home to the latest and first 320 slice CT scan in Pakistan. It also acquired the first wide bore 1.5 tesla MRI machine to cater to those with fear of narrow spaces. Yes! We care about our patients. The ultrasound department was further expanded to meet the growing requirements and evening staff added to offer extended services to minimize patient waiting time. The old machines were also replaced with only the highest end equipment to ensure each of our patient got uniform high end imaging. The radiography department was also upgraded with both CR and DR systems being engaged to offer the highest level of digital imaging. In-house nuclear department was also inaugurated to provide patient with complete imaging facility under one roof. Going beyond imaging, the interventional suit was also established and patients were given options of benefiting from this minimally invasive form of treatment which was lacking in the Islamabad region.

To take the department at par with the highest level of technological advancement, the old viewing stations were replaced with the best medical grade monitors so that the finest detail in each image would be manifested. The systems were integrated by PACS system so that all available imaging of the patient could be compared and correlated. Taking things to the next level, voice recognition system was acquired known as Dragon. This unique software would listen to each radiologist, recognizing his individual accent and within no time generate a written document of the dictation. This recent development and expansion of available staff members comes in line with our vision to reduce reporting time and make reports available to patients as soon as possible.

The department has become a benchmark institute and its services have been sought after to train and raise the standard of radiology practice in the more peripheral areas such as Gilgit Baltistan. At least 2 batches of radiologists have been trained in this regards and further batches are in the queue. Yes, we have stepped out to share our abilities with the rest so that the nation benefits! This is above and beyond the already in place radiology training program that churns out highly trained residents and fellows in diagnostic radiology, intervention and body imaging. Sharing is caring and we offer our services to other cities as well such as Faisalabad. Lahore and Peshawar by means of teleradiology.



Pharmacy

The department of Pharmacy was one of the initial departments to be established at SIH. We have qualified pharmacists and technicians to serve the community with an aim to provide modern pharmaceutical care. We aim to provide cost effective, compassionate, quality pharmaceutical care through optimum support to all clinical areas with complete guidance information and counseling to health care providers & patients.

We have gradually developed into a multidisciplinary division looking after 450 inpatient beds including 100 critical care beds also Ambulatory care services for 200 plus consultants & 1200 plus out patients. We provide specialized services like Bone Marrow, Liver transplant and Kidney Transplant, Complex plastic & reconstructive surgery and Complex Orthopedic surgery including hip & knee replacement.

Critically ill patients require support beyond what a physician & nurse can provide alone. This support comes from several services that in many ways are core contributors of modern healthcare delivery system. Pharmacy is one of these pivotal clinical support services which are working to ensure safe, effective, patient-centered, efficient & equitable pharmaceutical care to each patient.

Our Pharmacists get trained to dispense evidence based medicines by thorough reviewing of each prescription, critically evaluating and intervening to rectify any prescribing error for safe medication. We are not limited to the traditional role of just dispensing medicines. Our first line Pharmacists, besides being involved as a active health care team member focusing on therapeutic drug monitoring (TDM) for better outcome of therapy & patient safety.


Each and every prescription is reviewed by the pharmacist for completeness and appropriateness of the medications and when required consult with physicians to modify and correct the prescriptions on standardize hospital formulary.

Clinical Pharmacy in Pakistan is not a common term understood by patients but is used in Pharmacy practice globally. Clinical pharmacy is a health specialty which describes the activities and services of the clinical pharmacist to develop and promote the rational and appropriate use of medicinal products and devices. At Shifa, clinical pharmacy is a small but strong part of pharmacy services division.

The main focus of present day clinical pharmacist is on Antibiotic Stewardship, Antibiotics are the most widely prescribed drugs across the world. Infections from various microbes and other organisms occur on visit to hospital and clinics. Due to the irrational use of antibiotics, the most emerging danger for Antibiotic therapy is the development of resistance which is increasing over the years. To overcome the issue of resistance new antibiotic policy as per international guidelines has been implemented by division of pharmacy services. Restricted antibiotics are monitored and all antibiotics being used over 2 weeks require approval from Infectious disease specialist prior to further use. Ultimate goal is to prevent resistance to multiple antibiotics and to manage patient on evidence base antibiogram reports.

Drug allergy is the most common neglected part in health care delivery system leading to adverse drug reaction. Pharmacist at the time of admission make sure diagnosis and known drug allergy must extend in patient's profile which ensures and saves the patient from any drug induced reaction. Moreover, drug-drug interaction is a very important and sensitive part of pharmacist's services. To facilitate our bench pharmacist we have entered 1005 drug-drug interactions in to our system; and this process is still ongoing.

Holistically, the division of pharmacy services at Shifa International Hospital is playing its role as strong team member along with physicians, nurses, & other paramedics.



Operation Rooms

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Over the span of 20 years, ORs excelled as one of the leading revenue generating departments in SIH. Shifa International Hospital Currently has 14 operating rooms which are taking care of all minor and major surgeries. To meet the demand of our valued patients and surgeons and to avoid long waiting lists for surgeries, the Management of SIH realized a dire need to develop more Operation Rooms. We have designed 14 new JCIA standard operating rooms which will be functional

14660 surgeries were done in 2012-13 (July-June), and target of 15000 was set for the year 2013-14. It is worth mentioning that ORs is far ahead and with the grace of Almighty Allah will exceed the set target. With the growth rate of 12.1% 15708 surgeries performed in OR.

Liver Transplant and donor Hepatectomy surgeries were started in May 2012. Currently we are doing 4-6 liver transplant surgeries on average each month. New born baby handing over and verification of documents, sex. weight, tag, and thumb scan & foot scan has been implemented.

Theater Management System is developed in collaboration with IT department and will start working in new operating rooms. A big milestone for the past year is the development of new CSSD, designed according to JCIA standards at E-2 floor.

Some of our future plans include, inaugurating new operation rooms at E-2 floor. JCIA implementation in Pre Op. Anesthesia, ORs, Recovery Rooms and CSSD, automation of Pre-Op, Anesthesia, ORs, Recovery Rooms and CSSD (software development done) and online tracking and reporting mechanism in collaboration with IT department. Starting Operation Room Technologist program with the collaboration of STMU through SIMT is also in our pipeline.





Support

Food and Nutrition Services Department (FNSD)

FNSD is dedicated to fulfill the nutritional requirements of the patients, their attendants, employees and medical staff, A team of qualified dietitians regularly supervises the preparation of food including all special diets like NG feeds. Renal, Hepatic, Neutropenic. Diabetic and blenderized spoon feeding etc. Accordingly, it is ensured that right diet and hot meals are served to the patients at all times. FNSD ensures that a high standard of hygiene is maintained at all times. Food served to the patients, employees, medical staff and visitors is prepared in a strictly hygienic condition. This is accomplished by regular medical checkups of all food handlers at regular interval. Indoor air quality is maintained as per ASHRAE standard in coordination with maintenance department.

Patients' service food trolleys are electrically heated with digital temperature display and temperature control thermostats. During distribution, trolleys are plugged in at floors to ensure that meals remain hot at the time of serving.

We provide around 1500 meals to the in-patients daily. In between meals, appropriate snacks according to their dietary requirements are also provided regularly. Approximately 5000 meals are provided in four cafeterias and lounges for Consultants and Managers/MOs/PGs, serving sumptuous and healthy food for all. Shawarma and salad-bar in Cafeteria-I is another delight for our customers. Subsidized/Economy meals for employees are always appreciated and praised.

To cater our clientele both in IPD and in the cafeterias, a fully equipped and well designed kitchen has been established to improve employees working conditions and to help them to perform their duties more efficiently. This newly designed kitchen has reduced the amount of injuries, discomfort and fatigue in the kitchen.

FNSD is ISO certified by the URS/UKAS. At present we are hopeful to achieve JCIA certification in near future. Catering services are another unique part of the Food & Nutrition Services Department, where delicious cuisine is served at official seminars and functions with the same consideration for health and hygiene. The professionalism and culinary skills, of our qualified staff are always admired by food lovers.

Facility Management Services (FMS)

In line with the corporate policy of responsible and ethical business practices, FMS undertook various initiatives to conserve energy, promote safety and play its part in facilitating the patients.

Variable Frequency Drives have been installed in all new constructions involving high HP rating motors. Energy efficient lights were installed in new and renovated areas and replaced in old areas as well. All HVAC filters were cleaned at regular intervals to avoid clogging and thereby reducing electric consumption. Power factor of generators and IESCO was maintained at 1.0 and 0.9 respectively so as to avoid energy losses. Moreover, split units were set at 26 OC to conserve electricity consumption. Lights installed in various areas were re-arranged to reduce number of extra lights. Laundry boiler and domestic water heaters were chemically cleaned for scale removal and to ensure better heat exchange and improved performance. Waste Heat Recovery Design has been finalized and offers for supply & installation of requisite equipment were received and are being evaluated.

As a result of these steps, maintenance department was able to save Rs. 2.200,014 (2.2 M) per month during peak season. This is despite the fact that new areas of 2500 square feet were built and 213 tons air-conditioning were added.

When it comes to the environment, we take every required measure to protect it. Medical waste gets segregated at floor levels. This is in accordance to international standards on waste management. After that it gets transported to an airconditioned room near Incineration site in covered trolleys. Post incineration, the medical waste ash gets disposed off in brick lined well in accordance to Ministry of Environment instructions. In case of non-operation of our Incinerators due maintenance activities, an alternate arrangement has been made with Attock oil refinery for safe disposal medical waste.


The Radiation facility fulfills the international standards and is regularly being inspected by Pakistan nuclear regulatory authority (PNRA) and International atomic energy Commission (IAEC). Moreover, proper waste management protocols are being followed for chemical usage in Laboratory, OT and housekeeping.

Occupational Safety & Health

The old and obsolete fire detection system is being replaced with state of the art addressable fire alarm system. We have recently laid fire cable in OPD and external areas have been accomplished. Smoke detector and exit signs will be put in place before end of September 2014 to facilitate patients, visitors and staff in the event of any emergency.

Moreover, the department has provided appropriate safety equipment to workers during construction work, safety and warning signs have been installed, inflectional control department carrying out the activities to identify any risks, hand rails installed at various locations of the hospital, exit evacuation plans placed in patient rooms, fire equipment has been procured, employees being vaccinated, appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) used in Lab (masks, goggles, head caps, gloves, lab coats, full attire (for infectious)) is available, and we make sure radiation workers get annual medical checkups.





Biomedical Engineering

Biomedical Engineering Services Department is responsible for operation, maintenance and repair of all held biomedical equipment. Our time and effort is spent in repair, maintenance, calibration and inspection of biomedical equipment to ensure its proper functionality and to avoid long down time. The Biomedical department with a team of qualified, trained, skilled and experienced team of Biomedical Engineers and support technicians managed over 96% uptime of biomedical equipment. Shifa International Hospital has around 2700 pieces of Biomedical Equipment on its inventory. This year total of 7357 repair request was received out of which 6697 were resolved. Only 209 pieces of equipment and minor components were declared defective.

All repairs of biomedical equipment are performed in a timely manner considering the criticality & urgency of equipment. To minimize down time of biomedical equipment, they are being monitored on daily basis. Biomedical Engineering Department adopts proactive approach, due to which it receives average 15 to 25 repair requests each days, majority of which are rectified on same day. In the following year Biomedical engineering department achieved over 96% uptime of 98% of biomedical equipment. The department is also responsible for inspecting all incoming newly inducted biomedical equipment.

We are also into enhancing technical skills and expertise to all support engineers and operational staff by providing trainings on newly inducted equipment through product experts of the supplying firms. Similarly, senior staff of Biomedical Department are assigned different topics to deliver lectures to share the knowledge and experience on biomedical equipment. Biomedical Engineering department is also focused to meet the quality objectives & support of patient care, JCIA procedures, enhance technical as well as professional standards to manage the equipment work flow.

Management Information Services

Management Information Services is the corner stone of all the Data for Shifa International Hospitals Ltd. The department has made is possible not only for physicians to access Health Records of the patients but even patients themselves can get access to it from electronic devices.

In addition to the records, the Management Information Services has introduced 1st time in Pakistan for the physicians to access radiology images at their offices and even their homes.

The major highlights of last year has been the introduction of the EMR in the Emergency Room. EMR at selected clinics, Filmless at the Radiology department and Emergency Room, Filmless at selected Outpatient Departments and Inpatient Departments. Dragon (Speech to Text) for the Radiology reporting by the Radiologists. The department has also introduced the access of the Patient's Health record through Shifa's Portal for its Patients.

MIS is looking forward to bring further automation in Credit and Collection department, Supply Chain, Inpatient Services and to help our patients spend less time at the Cashier points to process their payments by the next year.



We at Shifa International Hospitals Ltd are following the International best practices of Software deployment. It is based on Three Tier Architecture. Our Workstations are predominantly Open source under Red Hat and our Servers are deployed on Red Hat Operating Systems.

Management Information Services is segmented in Software and Application Engineering team. Hardware support team. Systems and Network Engineering team. Database Administration team. PACS team and Software training and Operation team which are led by 2 Senior Managers, a General Manager and a Chief Information Officer.

Management Information Services is looking forward the next year in completing the EMR for ALL Clinics and in the In Patient Services and the entire hospital to filmless.





Supply Chain

The essence of our Supply Chain management is to ensure timely provision of quality material to various end users all over the hospital, while maintaining optimum inventory levels. The department deals with a wide range of supplies, from medical consumables to food and beverage, covering all the items necessary in the day to day operations of the hospital. Our team of dedicated professionals is equipped with automated solutions to ensure effective and efficient control over the entire supply chain. From need assessment to planning and monitoring stock levels, our supply chain is geared up to cater to the growing requirements and the challenges posed in the healthcare sector.

Procurement

Hospital operations cannot be successfully executed without an efficient Procurement department. All areas of a healthcare organization seek support from procurement for the timely arrangement of essential supplies and equipment. Shifa Procurement team is trained and specialized to manage the comprehensive purchasing process incorporating all internal and external stake holders, taking in to considerations the potential risk factors which may jeopardize the organization interests. Procurement Department ensures cost effective hospital buying without compromising the quality. We make sure to purchase supplies and equipment from across the Globe well before stipulated deadlines.

We have launched SRM (Suppliers' Relationship Management) program where all suppliers have been categorized strategically according to their importance and business needs. The SRM program has resulted in significant and tangible improvements. All purchasing functions are integrated with main IT system, numerous system based reports have been included such as cost monitoring reports supplier evaluation reports, key performance indicators reports and many other. System up gradation is supporting all procurement individuals in order to efficiently monitor and plan their activities.

Security



Quality Assurance

Quality Assurance department is responsible for coordinating activities that are designed to fulfill the hospital's vision of delivering quality healthcare service through continuous monitoring and improving the quality of healthcare services provided to its patients.

In recent years, the increasing costs of healthcare in the presence of rising demands and limited resources has resulted in a greater emphasis on providing quality care to the patients. Achieving better results in healthcare means finding new and often innovative ways of looking at old and emerging problems ensuring that best practices are adopted and by appropriate utilization of all available resources.

Our mission is to ensure all patients receive exceptional care at Shifa International Hospitals Ltd. This is achieved by developing hospital-wide systems to deliver care based on current medical evidence and technology. Efficient processes with strong communication are developed. All the processes are designed to provide the most effective 'patient-centered' care possible. The Quality Assurance Department focuses on proactive systems to achieve these goals, and includes feedback from front-line staff as well as from patients.

We assist the hospital leadership to define priority areas for quality improvement and to measure and assess these priority clinical and management processes. The department is also actively involved in assisting departments and healthcare providers in the improvement of organizational performance and outcomes.

Quality Assurance is actively involved in various activities centered on process improvement, risk management and auditing and monitoring. It uses information from incidents report and complaints, monitoring activities and combined with accreditation requirements to identify room for improvement and to initiate Quality Improvement Projects.

Quality improvement is the responsibility of all departments and so Quality Assurance actively involves all hospital departments and services, and focuses on improved health outcomes and the prevention and reduction of medical errors. All of the quality assurance and performance improvement activities are based on the principles of safety, efficiency, effectiveness, timeliness and patient-centeredness.


Currently hospital is ISO 9001:2008 certified and working actively towards Joint Commission International Accreditation.


Nursing Education Services (NES)

Nursing is the largest health care profession and plays a vital role in provision of patient centered care and smooth running of health care system. Therefore, the department of Nursing Education Services (NES) provides the educational programs to the nurses and paramedical staff across the hospital in order to ensure safe and quality patient care. Health Care Education Division (HCED) is committed to provide rigorous training and grooming of our on board staff to enable them for clinical excellence round the clock by demonstrating caring and highly professional attitude towards the patients and families we serve.

Housekeeping

Housekeeping Department aims to provide clean safe and free from contamination environment and minimize the risk of exposure to infection. We focus on providing cleaning services to satisfy our valued patients, visitors and our hospital employees. The department puts its efforts in achieving the maximum efficiency possible in the care and comfort of the patients and in the smooth running of the hospital. Our daily tasks include dry and wet mopping of surfaces, scrubbing and polishing of all floors, sanitizing disinfection and spot cleaning of all area's (critical areas, sub critical and non critical), and waste management (collection, transportation, disposal of waste).





Horticulture

The Horticulture is an environment friendly department that is engaged in beautifying the premises. With 16 efficient and dedicated staff members, the department greatly contributes to appearance of the hospital and provides the services at an area of approximately 1,93,392' (sq/ft).

The team also actively participates in displaying plants on different occasions i.e. seminar, workshops, programs etc. of the hospital. In addition, Horticulture Department successfully manages a Green Area (outside of Shifa) for the Capital Development Authority (CDA) green belt i.e. City School U-Turn to Gate # 10 for the past 18 years.

Linen & Laundry

Linen and laundry is a recognized support service which not only ensures prevention and containment of hospital infection but also contributes to widen the image of the hospital in the eyes of public. Laundry staff provides on average more than 8000 per day washed and disinfected linen in the shape of bed sheets, blankets, staff uniform, operating room dresses, pillow covers etc.


Human Resource Development

Finance & Accounts department plays such a critical role in rapidly growing organizations Like Shifa that cannot be overemphasized. Shifa International's operations have seen phenomenal operations in couple of years after diversification of Company's business and subsequent geographic expansion. This also led to increase in the activity and operations of Finance & Accounts department. The department is looking after all the seaments of the Company, which are categorized in Shifa Hospital Islamabad, Shifa Hospital Faisalabad and at our other outlets having medical centers, lab pickup points and pharmacies located in Islamabad, Rawalpindi, Jhelum, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Lahore, Faisalabad and Peshawar. Finance and Accounts department has played its role in the development of the Company since its very beginning. The role of finance has been emerging from a conventional viewpoint to an innovation viewpoint. The transformation of the department involves Data Management, Planning and Budgeting, Performance Management and Business Intelligence. Finance department is of utmost importance as it is responsible for financial planning, thus ensuring that adequate funds are available for achieving the objectives of the Company. The functions of finance that includes tax, treasury, risk management which will contribute to the achievement of the strategic objectives and goals of the Company. Accounts department performs the

recording, retrieving, financial reporting and analyzing functions. The various stakeholders of the Shifa are directly or indirectly look towards Finance and Accounts department for its services. Management, employees, consultants, shareholders, vendors, bankers, regulatory authorities are the major stakeholders with which department regularly interacts. It also ensures compliance with a complex mix of regulatory requirements. These include legislative, financial, taxation, funding and governance matters and involve satisfying a wide range of agencies by designing processes, capturing or collecting information, preparing summary or analysis submissions and dealing with queries, either ad hoc or in response to information supplied. Department is also working on its strategic imperatives to enhance level of productivity in various departments of the Company. During the year under review, we closely coordinated with various other departments to cut the escalating costs and wastages. Finance & Accounts department regularly interacts with other departments for variance analysis as compared to previous periods and budgets. Costing of our services is also another important activity which is regularly carried out. Finance & Accounts department has to ensure that Company's financial statements are in compliance with various statutory, regulatory and International Financial Reporting Standards requirements. It is the prime focus of the department to ensure that Company maximizes its strategic capabilities and to create value from Shifa's capital budgeting, financing, and net working-capital activities.



Shifa Tameer-E-Millat University

The leadership of Shifa International Hospitals. Shifa Foundation and Tameer-e-Millat Foundation conceived the idea of establishing a University to shoulder their part of responsibility in dealing with the nation building process.

The efforts of dedicated leadership along with tireless collaboration of Shifa Family (Shifa International Hospitals, Ltd., Shifa Foundation and Tameer-e-Millat Foundation) have borne fruit with the incorporation of Shifa Tameer-e-Millat University (STMU). Shifa Tameer-e-Millat, being a not for profit entity, envisions to provide a platform for research oriented quality education to students from all over Pakistan and across the globe strictly on merit. The criteria for admission is independent of financial position and provides equal opportunities to all according to defined merit.

STMU is committed to excellence in the development and creation of knowledge. It aims to provide market-based modern education with highest possible standards in a wide range of disciplines to enable our talented youth to compete both within and outside the country.

STMU is a federally chartered, multi campus university. The campuses are equipped with state of the art facilities and equipment and highly qualified faculty. Shifa Tameer-e-millat University while working within its parameters of charter to create and disseminate knowledge in the fields of Health, Engineering, Business, Basic and Social Sciences. Character building of its students in keeping with our religious, historical and cultural ethos remain an integral part of the education.

Shifa College of Medicine and Shifa College of Nursing are constituent colleges of Shifa Tameer-e-Millat University.

STMU has established another important department by the name of Allied Health Services, It offers courses in Physical Therapy (DPT), Pharmacy (Pharma-D), Medical Lab Technologies (BSCMT) at undergraduate level. This department also offers professional development courses for Cancer Medical professionals, leading MBA and MS degrees in Health Services Management. The University management comprises of highly qualified and experienced educationists and professionals with strategic visionary approach to make this university as one of the best in the country especially in the field of Health Sciences. The faculty of the university is foreign qualified, experienced and very much exposed to modern teaching techniques and conscious of the needs and demands of global trends in academic standards.

Shifa Foundation

Shifa Foundation was founded in 1991 and has ever since been providing quality healthcare services to the underprivileged people of Pakistan. SF offers a range of services dealing in healthcare provision, management of malnutrition, reestablishment and development of healthcare facilities, development of clean water facilities and Gender Based Violence (GBV). Work is also being done on imparting health and hygiene education, trainings in different fields and provision of consultation, OPD, IPD and surgeries (at a subsidized rate or free of cost) to the deserving.

Tertiary Healthcare Services are being provided since 2001 not only through free consultations but also with medicines, lab services and tests at subsidized rates. During 2005, SF assisted the Internally Displace Persons (IDPs), who were suffering from the trauma of the devastating Earthquake. To support these destitute, SF joined hands with many others by dedicating 110 beds, conducting 400 operations and successfully treating 260 patients.

After the country-wide flood emergency of 2010. SF streamlined its activities to aid the devastated population across the 4 provinces of Pakistan. Initially, envisioned to cater to emergency specific needs, the 'Humanitarian Assistance Program' was formed. These needs often coinciding with those of the poor population in general prompted SF to reform its original objective to address a wider range of socioeconomic issues, making it gradually transition into the development sector.

SF has till now treated more than 2 million deserving patients in far-flung areas of Pakistan for communicable, chronic



and acute diseases and other medical complications. We have also treated around 70, 000 malnourished patients and screened and treated 3, 000 students with eye diseases in Gilgit-Baltistan. We have improved healthcare service delivery through revitalization, refurbishment and modernization of 77 healthcare facilities and trained more than 600 Healthcare providers. The department has raised awareness on Health, Hygiene and Infant & Young Child Feeding through conventional and electronic means. Moreover, we have also supported Sindh and Gilgit-Baltistan Government Health Departments in Extended Program for Immunization (EPI) and Polio Eradication Initiative (PEI) campaigns and the government's efforts to combat dengue epidemics.

Healthcare

According to the official data, only 12,804 health facilities exist in Pakistan (which include DHQH, THQH and BHU) to serve a large population of 180 million. The availability of already lacking healthcare services worsened during the floods in 2010, when 708 Government healthcare facilities within Sindh only, became un-operational. Realizing the need and the urgency, SF formed partnerships with International donors and began reestablishment efforts to restore these facilities and make them operational again. Due to the inaccessibility after flooding, SF also decided to run 19 Healthcare Mobile Units to reach out to the village level.

SF also provided Basic as well as Comprehensive Emergency Obstetrics, Neonatal and Child Healthcare services (EmONC) to the needy thus, strengthening the Maternal, Neonatal and Child Healthcare (MNCH) services (which include Antenatal care, postnatal, referral pathway, family planning and immunization/vaccination) in Sindh and Gilgit-Baltistan.

Moreover, SF has been trying to bring changes and innovation to the already existing healthcare structure in order to improve the healthcare services in the country. In line with this, SF operated a "Telemedicine" facility for hard-to-reach areas like Gilgit-Baltistan, which is sealed from the rest of the country for majority of the year. This facility is utilized by the residents consistently for online consultation from the highly qualified doctors of Shifa International Hospital. It is this idea that won the award of "Most Innovative Project" out of 1,364 projects during UNOCHA Internal Global Workshop. Due to the success, the program was also replicated in Mirpurkhas.

Furthermore, SF has aggressively worked to combat seasonal and communicable diseases such as Acute Respiratory Infection, Diarrhea/Cholera in the underdeveloped regions of Sindh, Punjab and Gilgit-Baltistan. SF also played its part in reestablishing the DEWs channel to preemptively combat any potential epidemic situation.

In addition to collaborated work to help the needy, SF's self-sustained Tertiary Servicesassist through consultations, IPDs, OPDs and surgeries to as many as 500 patients on daily basis. These ranges of services are being provided with respect to medicine, general surgery, pediatrics, Obs/Gyne, ENT, eye, family medicine and radiology.

Food and Nutrition

According to WHO, malnutrition is the underlying cause of more than half of child mortality and as per the 2010 Nutrition Survey, the nutrition indicators of Sindh alone are worse than of countries in Sub Saharan Africa. SF focused on managing the malnutrition of the women and children of the underdeveloped areas achieving it through a Community Based Model. It included screening, identifying and treating thousands of malnourished children and women within the targeted regions of Umerkot and Shaheed Benazirabad Districts. Based on the success of these two districts, SF has ventured into Sanghar as well, which is another district in Sindh.

Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH)

More than half the population of Pakistan is deprived of proper sanitation facilities, while 15.9 million people do not have access to safe drinking water. This causes deadly water-borne illnesses like diarrhea, worm infestation and skin diseases. SF contributed through raising awareness on these issues and has reached out to millions of people.

Healthcare

Furthermore, during a visit to Katpana, SF found various prevalent diseases such as severe diarrhea and other stomach illnesses that indicated presence of Arsenic in the drinking water. Arsenic is an odourless and colourless mineral that has been dubbed as "King of Poisons" due to its extreme potency and can prove to be fatal even in minute quantity. SF provided clean drinking water through a clean water bore, 21 sub-tanks and construction of a main water reservoir along with necessary plumbing, pipelining and primary as well as alternate water pumps.

Shelters and Non-shelter food items

Following the 2011 floods and rains in Pakistan, it was in Sindh only that, 796,861 houses were affected out of which 59% were damaged while the rest were destroyed completely. In these trying times, one of the immediate need SF identified was the lack of shelters and other life essentials. It provided more than 500 shelters to the unfortunate IDPs of Umerkot along with other essentials such as blankets, plastic sheets and kitchen sets.

Trainings

Shifa Foundation has invested considerable amount of resources in developing its training services which are now a part of SF's routine activities. Even currently, SF is running a training program for the entire Gilgit-Baltistan Health Network. These are primarily divided in 3 streams, namely Management, Technical and Clinical but further branches out into 17 more fields i.e. specialized trainings, radiology, Health Management, healthcare quality etc.

Media

SF recognizes the impactful role of media in bringing a positive behavioral change in population at large and thus, envisioned to go beyond conventional media ways. During the pursuit, SF developed its own in-house department, "Healthy Media" which started functioning in June, 2012. Healthy Media team comprises of professional producers, editors, cameramen, animators and designers.

This platform has been used to support the social, humanitarian and developmental services with the help of documentaries, videos, spots (Short documentaries for 30 seconds), commercials and promos. Healthy Media is equipped with state of the art equipment to produce documentaries, general video production, post-production editing, 2d and 3d graphics, special effects, print campaigns, advertising, seminars, conferences, training and event coverage.

Through Healthy Media, SF also created awareness on diseases such as pneumonia, diabetes, stroke, AIDS, cancer, tuberculosis as well as other areas such as patient rights & responsibilities, patient identification in healthcare settings and educational documentary for new mothers. Documentaries on World Health Day, diabetes and liver transplant have also been aired on Local Television Channels such as ATV and PTV. Moreover, training videos have been produced on themes such as nursing, pharmacy and JCIA (Joint Commission International Accreditation). 3-D technology is now being explored to develop detailed videos on Angiography, heart transplant and liver transplant.

Tameer-E-Millat Foundation

Tameer-e-Millat Foundation aims to provide quality education to every individual, in all academic and professional disciplines, without discrimination of gender, race, religion, socio economic status and ethnicity. We started out with just one school in 1987 and now have more than 200 schools in Pakistan. Our network comprises of 59 model schools, 180 community primary schools, 17, 508 students and 804 teachers.

FFCL sponsored transport facility for TMCE

fauji Fertilizer Company Ltd. (FFCL) is a major stakeholder in the urea market of Pakistan since 1978. FFCL has been kind enough to continue its support for promoting education. Both FFCL and TMF agreed to jointly work out for transport facility and students' sponsorship at Tameer-e-Millat Institute of Technology (TMIT). FFCL took the initiative in this regards and sponsored four Suzuki Bolans and one Toyota Hiace as a transport facility for TMCE. Sona Foundation of FFCL had already donated Olive plants in 2012.

Dandka School Opened

On February 10, 2014, TMF organized a ground breaking inauguration ceremony of The Maria-Helena Tameer-e-Millat



Primary School in Village Dandka, Tehsil Phalia, District Mandi Bahaudin, Province Punjab.

Establishment of science labs in girls' schools

TMF established science labs in two of its schools. Hafiz Maqbool Elahi Tameer-e-Millat Girls High School, Pind Dadan Khan and Tameer-e-Millat Model School for Girls, Dharyala Jalip. This was made possible by the financial assistance of the Australian Direct Aid Program (DAP). The primary focus of both these schools is to uplift the female students of the underprivileged community by providing quality education so that they may contribute towards society.

TMF organized training program for in-service teachers

An inspiring and vested teacher is considered to be a vital asset of any school. Since its establishment in 1987, TMF has organized more than 250 Teachers' training programs and seminars which proved to be fruitful for the professional development of about 4,000 teachers.

Recognizing the commitment and dedication of the teachers and the dire need for continuous training programs for in-service teachers, Vice Chairperson Dr. Samea K. Ahmad, is determined to keep this tradition going in order to equip the teachers with the latest developments in teaching methods.

Collaboration With Punjab Skills Development Fund

Tameer-e-Millat Foundation in collaboration with the Punjab Skill Development Fund (PSDF) sponsored by UKAID has initiated skills development training. The prime purpose of this training is to remove poverty producing skillful labor force. The training is intended to result employment and business opportunities to uplift living standards of the youth. This project is focused on the poor and vulnerable populations of the six poorest districts of South Punjab for improving their ability to find work or progress in their current employment. As an implementing partner, TMF through Tameer-e-Millat Institute of Technology (TMIT) trained 69 trainees in three trade groups i.e. Electrician, Repair & maintenance of Electrical Home Appliances and Quantity Surveyor. TMF remained among the highest achievers by successfully training 92% of the enrolled trainees. Now the second batch has started its training. TMF is determined to provide quality training to its trainees as

per industry requirements and will also collaborate with various employers for job placement as well as assistance in establishing their own businesses.

TMF believes in true and honest struggle and has been appreciating these efforts rendered by brilliant Tameerians for the last two and half decades. TMF searches for possible donors to sponsor these shining stars. Maria Helena Foundation announced Dr. Abdul Salam Science Scholarships for such hardworking students and five of the Tameerian achieved sponsorship for their studies. It is worth mentioning that all the achievers are studying in 9th grade currently and are female students. 

- During the year under review your Company earned revenue to the tune of Rs. 6,393.1 million versus Rs. 5,315.6 million in the last year. However, operating cost with the more utilization of services entailed the increase in costs pertaining to salaries, wages & benefits, utilities, supplies, medicines, repair & maintenance etc., resultantly operating cost increased to Rs. 5,622.2 million against Rs. 4,625.5 million in the last corresponding year. Profit before taxation worked out to be Rs. 636.6 million as against Rs. 540.3 million in the last year. However, your Company posted net profit after taxation of Rs. 464.6 million as compared to Rs. 388.2 million in the last corresponding year.
- 2- During the year under review earnings per share increased from Rs. 7.68 to Rs. 9.20.
- 3- Your directors are pleased to declare cash dividend of Rs. 3.00 per share for the year ended June 30, 2014.
- 4- The financial statements, prepared by the management of Shifa International Hospitals Limited, present fairly its state of affairs, the results of its operations, cash flows and changes in equity.
- 5- Proper books of accounts of Shifa International Hospitals Limited have been maintained as required by the Companies Ordinance, 1984.
- 6- Appropriate accounting policies have been consistently applied (except for a change disclosed in note 3.12 of the notes to the financial statements) in preparation of the financial statements and accounting estimates are based on reasonable and prudent judgment.
- 7- International Accounting Standards, as applicable in Pakistan, have been followed in preparation of financial statements.

Shah Naveed Saeed, Dr. Habib-Ur-Rahman, Mr. Muhammad Zahid & Dr. Mohammad Salim Khan attended six, seven, one and seven meeting(s) respectively. Dr. Samea Kauser Ahmad was inducted in the Audit Committee on April 28, 2014 whereafter till June 30, 2014 no meeting of the Audit Committee was scheduled.

- 23- During the year under review, the Company donated Rs. 10 million to Shifa Foundation and Rs. 18 million to Shifa Tameer-e-Millat University. Shifa Foundation is not for profit organization, providing medical treatment facilities to indigent and poor patients. The Company considers Shifa Foundation as its social arm for fulfilling corporate social responsibilities with respect to people and society. Whereas to ensure the credibility of the upcoming doctors and healthcare advocates, the three concerns namely Shifa International Hospitals Limited, Shifa Foundation and Tameer-e-Millat Foundation combined to sponsor their own Shifa Tameer-e-Millat University which would serve as an educational platform for the generations to come.
- 24- Company took following steps / initiatives to conserve electricity:
 - · Variable Frequency Drives have been installed in all new constructions involving high HP rating motors.
 - Energy efficient lights were installed in new / renovated areas and replaced in old areas as well.
 - All HVAC filters were cleaned at regular intervals to avoid clogging and thereby reducing electric consumption.
 - Power factor of generators and IESCO was maintained at 1.0 and 0.9 respectively so as to avoid energy losses.
 - Split units were set at 26°C to conserve electricity consumption.
 - · Lights installed in various areas were re-arranged to reduce number of extra lights.
 - Laundry boiler and domestic water heaters were chemically cleaned for scale removal and to ensure better heat exchange / improved performance.

As a result of these steps, Company was able to save 5092.625 KW (122,223 KWH) of electricity during peak season of June & July 2014 alone.

- 25- Company is equally mindful towards environment protection and its environmental protection measures meet the standards set by regulatory bodies in connection with hospital waste management and radiation.
- 26- In addition to our endeavor to install state of the art addressable fire alarm system the Company has been undertaking different activities to ensure occupational safety and health which include but are not limited to provision of appropriate safety equipment to workers during construction work, installation of safety & warning signs, installation of hand rails at various location of the hospital, vaccination of employees, annual medical checkup of radiation workers etc.
- 27- For the awareness of general public Company celebrated following days and also offered free seminars/ screenings to the general public during the year under review:
 - World Hepatitis Day (July 31, 2013) Free screening for Hepatitis B & C
 - · World Heart Day (September 28, 2013) Free seminar
 - Global Hand Washing Day (October 12, 2013)
 - World Stroke Day (October 29, 2013) Seminar to highlight measures to prevent stroke.
 - World Diabetic Day (November 13, 2013) Free screening
 - World Kidney Day (March 13, 2014)
 - World No Tobacco Day (June 1, 2014)
- 28- Shifa International Hospitals Limited has evolved to become one of the major providers of healthcare in Pakistan. We have extended our outreach in Faisalabad; with our state of the art Faisalabad Hospital providing the standardized quality services. We have lab pick up points and pharmacy outlets in various locations of Pakistan including Islamabad, Quetta, Mardan, Peshawar, Jhelum, Gujrat, Faisalabad, Gujranwala and Lahore. Besides for the promotion of medical tourism we have established representative offices in Dubai and Afghanistan.

- 29- During the year under review the Company has acquired on rent a building at G-10/4 for the establishment of a hospital which would offer primary care services and limited diagnostic and IPD services.
- 30- As tertiary care facility; critical care plays a vital role, our focus has been to sustain and expand a facility with improved and enhanced infection control measures and patient safety standards. In the wake of our said focus we have added 19 critical area beds in different specialities. The critical care facility has been expanded with the addition of Peads ICU (4 Beds), Peads Step Down (5 Beds) and Neuro Step Down (10 Beds). At Shifa we are now functioning with 121 Critical Area Beds. This includes 11 beds in SICU, 13 beds in SSD, 10 Beds in MICU, 10 beds in MSD, 32 Beds in NICU, 17 Beds in Cardiac Cath, 9 Beds in PICU, 5 beds in NSD, 4 Beds in Stroke Unit, 6 beds in E-4 Liver Transplant Unit and 4 beds in F-4 BMT.
- 31- F- Block extension consists of 2 basements comprising of Auditoriums, Conference Halls & Admin Block. As part of the same extension, existing F-1 radiology and F-2 OR will also be extended. Moreover around 100 Inpatient beds will be added at F-3 / F-4 area being part of F block extension.
- 32- As healthcare industry we are constantly taking effective measures to mitigate the risks and improve our quality control targets. For this purpose, we expanded our Central Sterile Services Department (CSSD) with cutting edge technology. The CSSD has been implemented with international standards which will help further in safe practices.
- 33- Cath Lab has also been expanded and shifted to F-3 floor. We have now three cath labs. Third floor of F-Block has been evolved as a composite cardiac care unit of Cath Lab & Cardiac Cath Unit (17 Beds).
- 34- New and improved state of the art lab facility with its segments Hematology, Biochemistry, Histopathology and Microbiology has been relocated at D-4. Previous lab was at 9,000 sq/ft at A-0 while new lab has an area of 17,700 sq/ft.
- 35- To cater the needs of our valued patients following planning / restructuring / expansion activities are being undertaken:
 - It has been planned to extend Inpatient area by adding 33 surgical beds at A-2 / B-2.
 - Propositions have been designed for the construction of 5th & 6th floors. Floor 5 will be IPD area & floor 6 will have meeting halls, offices, consultants' offices & NES.
 - Our Outpatient facilities are also being aligned and revamped in terms of space, technology and ambiance. Following clinics have been upgraded:
 - a) Ophthalmology Clinic (Relocated from 3760 sq/ft to 5600 sq/ft)
 - b) Neurology Clinic (Relocated from 2671 sq/ft to 3790 sq/ft)
 - c) Peads Clinic (Expanded from 3000 sq/ft to 8000 sq/ft)
 - d) Cardiology Clinic (5 echo rooms have been shifted to this area, Expanded to 9,427 from 6,827 sq/ft)

- The directors have confirmed that none of them is serving as a director on more than seven listed companies, including this Company.
- 3. All the resident directors of the Company are registered as taxpayers and none of them has defaulted in payment of any loan to a banking company, a DFI or an NBFI or, being a member of a stock exchange, has been declared as a defaulter by that stock exchange.
- No causal vacancy occurred in the Board during the year ended June 30, 2014.
- The Company has prepared a "code of conduct" and has ensured that appropriate steps have been taken to disseminate it throughout the Company along with its supporting policies and procedures.
- 6. The Board has developed a vision/mission

- statement, overall corporate strategy and significant policies of the Company. A complete record of particulars of significant policies along with the dates on which they were approved or amended has been maintained.

1 STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

Shifa International Hospitals Limited ("the Company") was incorporated in Pakistan on September 29, 1987 as a private limited company under the Companies Ordinance, 1984 and converted into a public limited company on October 12, 1989. The Company is listed on all the three stock exchanges of Pakistan. The registered office of the Company is situated at Sector H-8/4, Islamabad.

The principal activity of the Company is to establish and run medical centres and hospitals in Pakistan. The Company has established its first hospital in 1993 in Islamabad and second hospital in 2011 in Faisalabad. Besides this, the Company is running medical centres, pharmacies and lab collection points in different cities of Pakistan.

2 BASIS OF PREPARATION

2.1 Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. Approved accounting standards comprise of such International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) issued by the International Accounting Standard Board as are notified under the Companies Ordinance, 1984, provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Ordinance, 1984. In case requirements differ, the provisions or directives of the Companies Ordinance, 1984 shall prevail.

2.2 Basis of measurement

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified by:-

- revaluation of certain items of property, plant and equipment; and
- recognition of certain employee benefits at present value.

2.3 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Pak Rupees, which is the Company's functional and presentation currency.

2.4 Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting standards requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making judgment about carrying value of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which estimates are revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Judgments made by management in the application of the approved accounting standards that have significant effect on the financial statements and estimates with a significant risk of material adjustment in the next year are discussed in the ensuing paragraphs.

2.4.1 Property, plant and equipment

The Company reviews the useful lives of property, plant and equipment on regular basis. Any change in estimates in future years might affect the carrying amounts of the respective items of property, plant and equipment with a corresponding effect on the depreciation/ amortization charge and impairment.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2014

2.4.2 Provision for doubtful debts

The Company estimates the recoverability of the trade debts and provides for doubtful debts based on its prior experience. The carrying amounts of trade debts and provision for doubtful debts are disclosed in note 18 to these financial statements.

2.4.3 Stock in trade / stores, spares and loose tools

The Company reviews the net realizable value of stock in trade and stores, spares and loose tools to assess any diminution in the respective carrying values. Net realizable value is determined with reference to estimated selling price less estimated expenditures to make the sale.

2.4.4 Employee benefits

The Company operates approved funded gratuity scheme covering all its employees who have completed the minimum qualifying period of service as defined under the scheme. The gratuity scheme is managed by trustees. The calculation of the benefit requires assumptions to be made of future outcomes, the principal ones being in respect of increase in remuneration and the discount rate used to convert future cash flows to current values. The assumptions used for the plan are determined by independent actuary on annual basis.

The amount of the expected return on plan assets is calculated using the expected rate of return for the year and the market-related value at the beginning of the year. Gratuity cost primarily represents the increase in actuarial present value of the obligation for benefits earned on employee service during the year and the interest on the obligation in respect of employee service in previous years, net of the expected return on plan assets. Calculations are sensitive to changes in the underlying assumptions.

2.4.5 Taxation

The Company takes into account the current income tax law and decisions taken by appellate authorities. Instances where the Company's view differs from the view taken by the income tax department at the assessment stage and where the Company considers that its view on items of material nature is in accordance with law, the amounts are shown as contingent liabilities.

2.4.6 Contingencies

The Company has disclosed significant contingent liabilities for the pending litigations and claims against the Company based on its judgment and the advice of the legal advisors for the estimated financial outcome. The actual outcome of these litigations and claims can have an effect on the carrying amounts of the liabilities recognised at the balance sheet date. However, based on the best judgment of the Company and its legal advisors, the likely outcome of these litigations and claims is remote and there is no need to recognise any liability at the balance sheet date.

2.5 New accounting standards, interpretations and amendments

During the year certain amendments to standards or new interpretations became effective, however, the amendments or interpretation did not have any material effect on these financial statements.

The following revised standards and amendments and interpretations to the approved accounting standards, as applicable in Pakistan, would be effective from the dates mentioned below against the respective standard.

3 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements except a change disclosed in note 3.12 below.

3.1 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment except freehold, leasehold land and capital work in progress are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation/ amortization and impairment in value, if any. Leasehold land is stated at revalued amount being the fair value at the date of revaluation, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and impairment losses while freehold land is stated at revalued amount being the fair value at the date of revaluation, less any subsequent impairment losses, if any. Any revaluation increase arising on the revaluation of such assets is credited in 'Surplus on Revaluation of Property, Plant and Equipment'. A decrease in the carrying amount arising on revaluation is charged to profit or loss to the extent that it exceeds the balance, if any, held in the surplus on revaluation account relating to a previous revaluation of that asset. Leasehold land is amortized over the lease period extendable up to 99 years.

The surplus on revaluation of property, plant and equipment to the extent of incremental depreciation / amortization charged on the related asset is transferred to unappropriated profit.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2014

Capital work-in-progress and stores held for capital expenditure are stated at cost less any impairment loss recognised, if any. All expenditure connected with specific assets incurred during installation and construction period are carried under capital work-in-progress. These are transferred to specific item of property, plant and equipment when available for intended use.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance costs that do not meet the recognition criteria are charged to profit and loss account as and when incurred.

Depreciation/ amortization is charged to profit and loss account commencing when the asset is ready for its intended use, applying the straight-line method over the estimated useful life.

In respect of additions and disposals during the year, depreciation/ amortization is charged when the asset is available for use and up to the month preceding the asset's classification as held for sale or derecognized, whichever is earlier.

Assets are derecognized when disposed off or when no future economic benefits are expected to flow from its use. Gains and losses on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment are determined by comparing the proceeds from disposal with the carrying amount of property, plant and equipment, and are recognized on net basis within "other income" in profit and loss account.

3.2 Leases

Leases are classified as finance lease whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the Company. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

Finance leases as lessee

The Company recognizes finance leases as assets and liabilities in the balance sheet at amounts equal, at the inception of the lease, to the fair value of the asset or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. In calculating the present value of the minimum lease payments the discount factor used is the interest rate implicit in the lease. Initial direct costs incurred are included as part of the amount recognized as an asset. The liabilities are classified as current and long term depending upon the timing of payment. Lease payments are apportioned between the finance charge and the reduction of outstanding liability. The finance charge is allocated to periods during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability for each period. Finance charges are charged directly to profit and loss account.

Operating leases/ljarah contracts

As lessor

Rental income from operating leases is recognized on straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease.

As lessee

Rentals payable under operating leases / Ijarah are charged to profit and loss account on a straight-line basis over the term of relevant lease / Ijarah.

3.3 Impairment

Non financial assets

The Company assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is any indication that assets except deferred tax assets and inventory may be impaired. If such indication exists, the carrying amounts of such assets are reviewed to assess whether they are recorded in excess of their recoverable amount. Where carrying values exceed the respective recoverable amounts, assets are written down to their recoverable amounts and the resulting impairment loss is recognized in profit and loss account except for the impairment loss on revalued assets, which is adjusted against the related revaluation surplus to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the surplus on revaluation of that asset. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and its value in use.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2014

Where impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised recoverable amount but limited to the extent of the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of depreciation/amortization) had no impairment loss been recognized for the asset in prior years. Reversal of impairment loss is recognized in profit and loss account.

Financial assets

Financial assets are assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence that they are impaired. A financial asset is impaired if objective evidence indicates that a loss event has occurred after the initial recognition of the asset, and that the loss event had a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of that asset that can be estimated reliably. Objective evidence that financial assets are impaired may include default or delinquency by a debtor, indications that a debtor or issuer will enter bankruptcy.

3.4 Investments

All purchases and sales of investments are recognized using settlement date accounting. Settlement date is the date on which that investments are delivered to or by the Company. All investments are derecognized when the rights to receive cash flows from the investments have expired or have been transferred and the Company has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

3.5 Investments held to maturity

Investments with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturity that the Company has the positive intent and ability to hold till maturity are classified as investment held to maturity. These are initially recognized at cost inclusive of transaction cost and are subsequently carried at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method less impairment loss, if any. This method uses an effective interest rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the investment to its net carrying amount.

3.6 Stores, spare parts and loose tools

These are valued at cost, determined on moving average cost basis, or net realizable value, whichever is lower, less allowance for obsolete and slow moving items. For items which are slow moving and/or identified as surplus to the Company's requirement, a provision is made for excess of book value over estimated net realizable value. The Company reviews the carrying amount of stores, spare parts and loose tools on a regular basis and provision is made for obsolescence, if there is any change in usage pattern and physical form of related stores, spare parts and loose tools.

3.7 Stock-in-trade

Stock-in-trade is valued at lower of cost, determined on moving average basis or net realizable value. The Cost includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the stock items and other cost incurred in bringing them to their present location and condition.

3.8 Trade debts and other receivables

Trade debts and other receivables are carried at original bill amount less an estimate made for doubtful receivables based on review of outstanding amounts at the year end, Balances considered bad and irrecoverable are written off against provision.

3.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are carried in the balance sheet at cost. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, cheques in hand, balances with banks and highly liquid short term investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of change in value with maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition and short term borrowings.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2014

3.10 Financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are recognized when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. These are derecognized when the Company looses control of contracted rights that comprise the financial assets and in the case of financial liabilities when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expired. Any gain or loss on derecognition of financial assets and financial liabilities is included in profit & loss account currently.

The particular recognition methods adopted by the Company are disclosed in the individual policy statements associated with each item of the financial instruments.

3.11 Offsetting

A financial asset and a financial liability is offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet, if the Company has a legal enforceable right to set-off the recognized amounts and intends either to settle on net basis or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

3.12 Employee benefits

Defined benefit plan

The Company operates approved funded gratuity scheme for all its employees who have completed the minimum qualifying period of service as defined under the respective scheme. Provision is made annually to cover obligations under the scheme on the basis of actuarial valuation and is charged to income. The most recent valuation was carried out as at June 30, 2014 using the "Projected Unit Credit Method". The results of actuarial valuation are summarized in note 9.4 of these financial statements.

The amount recognized in the balance sheet represents the present value of defined benefit obligations as reduced by the fair value of plan assets.

Consequent to the revision of IAS 19 "Employees Benefits" which is effective for annual periods beginning on or after January 01, 2013, the Company has changed its accounting policy wherein, the actuarial gains and losses (remeasurement gains / (losses) on Employees' Gratuity Fund benefit are recognized immediately in Other Comprehensive income. Previously, the actuarial gains or losses in excess of corridor limit were recognized in profit and loss over the remaining service life of the employees. In accordance with the transitional provisions of IAS 19, the change in accounting policy has been accounted for retrospectively and the comparative figures have thereby been restated as below. The adoption of above accounting policy has no effect on the cash flow statement.

Calculation of gratuity requires assumptions to be made of future outcomes which mainly include increase in remuneration, expected long term return on plan assets and the discount rate used to convert future cash flows to current values. Calculations are sensitive to changes in the underlying assumptions.

Compensated absences

The Company provides for compensated absences of its employees on unavailed balance of leaves in the period in which the leave is earned. Accrual to cover the obligations is made using the current salary levels of the employees.

3.13 Trade and other payables

Liabilities for trade and other amounts payable are measured at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received.

3.14 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the amount can be made. However, provisions are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

3.15 Taxation

Taxation for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Taxation is recognized in the profit and loss account except to the extent that it relates to items recognized directly in equity or in other comprehensive income.

Current

Provision for current taxation is based on taxable income at the current rates of tax after taking into account applicable tax credits, rebates, losses and exemptions available, if any.

Deferred

Deferred tax is accounted for using the balance sheet liability method in respect of all taxable temporary differences arising from differences between the carrying amount of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and tax credits can be utilised. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date and are reduced to the extent that is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realized.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2014

Deferred tax is calculated at the rates that are expected to apply to the period when the differences reverse, based on tax rates that have been enacted. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax liabilities and assets and they relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the same taxable entity or on different tax entities but they intend to settle current tax liabilities and assets on a net basis or their tax assets and liabilities will be realised simultaneously.

3.16 Foreign currencies

Transactions in currencies other than Pak Rupees are recorded at the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of transactions. At each balance sheet date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rate prevailing on the balance sheet date. Gains and losses arising on retranslation are included in net profit or loss for the year.

3.17 Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts received or receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business. Revenue is recognised in the accounting period in which the services are rendered and goods are delivered and it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transactions will flow to the Company and the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably.

Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount.

Rental income is recognized on a straight line basis over the term of the rent agreement.

Scrap sales and miscellaneous receipts are recognised on realised amounts.

3.18 Borrowings

Borrowing are recognized initially at fair value net off transaction cost incurred and are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method. Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the Company has an unconditional right to defer settlement of liability for at least twelve months after the balance sheet date.

3.19 Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs which are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset are capitalised as part of the cost of that asset. All other borrowing costs are charged to profit or loss.

3.20 Earnings per share

The Company presents basic and diluted earnings per share (EPS) data for its ordinary shares. Basic EPS is calculated by dividing the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders of the Company by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the period. Diluted EPS is determined by adjusting the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholder and weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding for the effects of all potential ordinary shares.

3.21 Dividend

Dividend is recognised as a liability in the period in which it is declared.

3.22 Non current asset held for sale

Non-current assets are classified as held for sale when their carrying amounts are expected to be recovered principally through a sale transaction and a sale is considered highly probable. They are stated at the lower of carrying amount immediately prior to their classification as held for sale and fair value less cost to sell. Once classified as held for sale, the assets are not subject to depreciation or amortization.

- 4.1 The Company has only one class of ordinary shares which carries no right to fixed income. The shareholders are entitled to receive dividends as declared from time to time and are entitled to one vote per share at meetings of the Company. 37 FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Company has exposure to the following risks from its use of financial instruments:

Credit risk Liquidity risk Market risk

This note presents information about the Company's exposure to each of the above risks, the Company's objectives, policies and processes for measuring and managing risk and the Company's management of capital. Further quantitative disclosures are included throughout these financial statements.

The Board of Directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework and policies.

The Company's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risks faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Company's activities. The Company through its training and management standards and procedures aims to develop a disciplined and constructive control environment in which all employees understand their roles and obligations.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2014

The Audit Committee oversees how management monitors compliance with the Company's risk management policies and procedures and reviews the adequacy of the risk management framework in relation to the risks faced by the Company. The Audit Committee is assisted in its oversight role by Internal Audit. Internal Audit undertakes both regular and adhoc reviews of risk management controls and procedures, the results of which are reported to the Audit Committee.

37.1 Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. The Company manages credit risk in trade debts by limiting significant exposure to the customers not having good credit history. Furthermore, the Company has credit policy in place to ensure that services are rendered to customers with an appropriate credit history.

The Company is also exposed to credit risk from its operating and short term investing activities. The Company's credit risk exposures are categorised under the following headings:

37.1.1 Counterparties

The Company conducts transactions with the following major types of counterparties:

Trade debts

Trade debts are essentially due from government companies/institutions, private companies (panel companies) and individuals to whom the Company is providing medical services. Normally the services are rendered to the panel companies on agreed rates and limits from whom the Company does not expect any inability to meet their obligations. The Company manages credit risk in trade debts by limiting significant exposure to the customers not having good credit history. Furthermore, the Company has credit policy in place to ensure that services are rendered to customers with an appropriate credit history.

The Company establishes an allowance for impairment that represents its estimate of incurred losses in respect of trade debts. This allowance is based on the management's assessment of a specific loss component that relates to individually significant exposures.

Cash and investments

The Company limits its exposure to credit risk by investing in liquid securities and maintaining bank accounts only with counterparties that have a credit rating of at least A3 and BBB. Given these credit ratings, management does not expect any counterparty to fail to meet its obligations.

37.2 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Company's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Company's reputation. For this purpose the Company has credit facilities as mentioned in notes 7, 11 and 32 to the financial statements. Further liquidity position of the Company is monitored by the Board through budgets, cash flow projections and comparison with actual results.

37.3 Market risk

The objective of market risk management is to manage and control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters, while optimizing the return on risk. 37.3.2 Markup rate risk

The markup rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flow of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in the market markup rates. Sensitivity to markup rate risk arises from mismatches of financial assets and liabilities that mature in a given period. The Company's exposure to the risk of changes in market markup rates relates primarily to Company's long term debt obligations with floating markup rates.

The Company analyses its markup rate exposure on a dynamic basis. Various scenarios are simulated taking into consideration refinancing, renewal of existing positions, alternative financing. Based on these scenarios, the Company calculates the impact on profit and loss of a defined markup rate shift. For each simulation, the same markup rate shift is used for all currencies. The scenarios are run only for liabilities that represent the major markup-bearing positions.

The Company adopts a policy to ensure that markup rate risk is minimized by investing its surplus funds in fixed rate investments like TDRs.

37.5 Capital management

The Company's objectives when managing capital are to safeguard the Company's ability to continue as a going concern so that it can continue to provide returns for shareholders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain a strong capital base to support the sustained development of its business. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Company may adjust the amount of dividend to ordinary shareholders. There were no changes to the Company's approach to capital management during the year.

37.5.1 Debt-to-adjusted capital ratio

The Company monitors capital on the basis of the debt-to-adjusted capital ratio. This ratio is calculated as net debt divided by adjusted capital. Net debt is calculated as total debt (as shown in the balance sheet) less cash and cash equivalents. Adjusted capital comprises all components of equity (i.e. share capital, share premium, and unappropriated profit) and includes some forms of subordinated debt.
